Death of Ronald Thomson.

Ronald S., son of John and Jeannette Thomson, was born at Stewart Run, Pa., March 31, 1869, and died at Kane, Pa., February 20, 1891.

About four weeks ago Ronald, with his brother James, began work near Kane, and a short time after was taken sick.

From the beginning his trouble assumed a serious phase, and others of the family went on from here to minister to his wants.

Physicians were in attendance almost constantly, the disease having developed into spinal meningitis.

At one time, he showed signs of improvement, and hopes of his recovery were entertained by his friends, but another turn for the worse came, and all that loving friends and medical skill could do, failed, and Friday night last death came and relieved him of his intense suffering.

Ronald was the tenth in a family of twelve children—nine boys and three girls—all grown, his death being the first that has taken place in this large and happy family.

He was a young man of quiet disposition; friendly, gentlemanly, industrious, and of excellent moral habits.

His remains were brought to this place on Saturday last, and on Monday afternoon, at 2 o'clock, the funeral took place from the M. E. Church, Rev. Rumberger conducting the services, and delivering a touching, admonitory sermon.

The interment took place in Riverside Cemetery, and the very large assemblage of citizens who gathered on that occasion attested the high esteem in which the deceased has always been held in this community.

To the aged parents, brothers and sisters, the sympathy of all goes out in the loss of a loved and loving son and brother.
