We are in receipt of Census Bulletin No. 105, dated Aug. 13, giving the as last on account of other fruit being population of Pennsylvania by counties and minor divisions. From this we learn that the total population of berries matured, ripened, and fell off the State on June 1, 1880, was 4,282. 891, and in 1890 it was 5,258,014, an increase of 975,123, or 22.77 per cent. during ten years.

There are sixty seven counties it the State, of which only twelve show decreases. In no case is the decrease greater than 9 per cent. The counties showing decreases are as follows: Armstrong, Clarion, Crawford, Fulton, Juniata, Mercer, Monroe, Perry, Pike, Sayder, Susquehanna, and Wayne. The counties showing increases of more than 50 per cent. are as follows: Allegheny, Clearfield, Elk, Forest Jeffer son, Luckawanna, Luzerne, and Potter. Philadelphia and Allegheny counties show the largest numerical increases. Philadelphia county shows an increase of 199,794, or 23 58 per cent., while Allegheny county shows an increase of 196,090, or 55 10 per cent. The largest percentage of increase is found in Forest county, where there has been an increase of 93 43 per cent. since 1880. In other words Forest still has the proud distinction of being the banner county of the State.
