THE McKinley bill has scored another signal triumph in causing the removal of the German embargo against the American hog. The Democratic party attempted to judge the bill one month after it had gone into effect. Ten months have now passed since the bill became a law, and it is to-day a vindicated measure.

OUR democratic friends need not "sit up o' nights" worrying about who is to be the new Secretary of War. Benjamin Harrison has the faculty of selecting good men to serve under him very highly developed, and it is he, and not the democrats, that will decide upon Secretary Proctor's successor. Of one thing everybody may be certain, the man will be worthy of the position he is to fill.

THE newspapers which have been "on the fence" for months are now jumping down upon Balmeada, the deposed President of Chili, whom they have suddenly discovered to have been about ninety-six kinds of a tyrant. The world always approves the winner, which is but another proof of the truth of the disputed poem—"Laugh and the world laughs with you; weep and you weep alone."

THE Democratic convention at Harrisburg last Thursday, that is, Mr. Harry's convention, nominated Robert E. Wright, of Lehigh county, for Auditor General, and A. L. Tilden, of Erie county, Mr. Harry's deputy secretary, for State Treasurer. The day before the convention the Harrisburg Patriot, the leading Democratic paper of the State, contained this warning, but it was not heeded:

"If one or both the nominees of tomorrow's convention come from or seem to come from any one man, who, as Governor Pattison has put it, 'keeps his hand on the machine,' or from any combination of men who care only for party control to reach selfish ends the nominee or nominees will be defeated. There is nothing better in a Boss dominated Democratic convention than in a Boss Republican convention. The touch of the Boss on the most reputable man is the burning mark of the destroyer. If we are to win this year it must be through Republican support."

Next day the same Patriot received the nominations in the coldest possible manner, and thus spoke of the platform adopted:

"The monotonous iteration of arraignment and condemnations dragging through the formal resolutions of yesterday's convention, compiled by a voluble official desirous of dignifying his own work and revised by worthy gentlemen who should have prepared the original platform, sink into nothingness."

Democratic Indifference.

The Pittsburg Chronicle-Telegraph is authority for the statement that a prominent Democrat of State fame, who had once been on the Democratic State ticket, and who attended the Democratic State Convention last week and took part in its proceedings, said, on his way home from the convention, that Wright and Tilden, the Democratic nominees, will be defeated by an overwhelming Republican majority. This is not the only Democrat who is talking in that strain. A delegate from Philadelphia to last Thursday's Democratic convention, a man of intelligence who notes carefully the run of affairs, told the writer that the Democratic State ticket would not have the ghost of a chance, and that in Philadelphia alone Gregg and Morrison would get 25,000 majority. Add to this 18,000 in Allegheny county and about 40,000 majority in the other counties of the State, and it will be seen that the Republican ticket is good for 75,000 this year. The Democrats did not make their ticket. It was selected for them, and they merely came to Harrisburg and ratified the selection. It is a fact that they are indifferent already to the outcome of the campaign and this feeling grows as election day comes on. Nobody will be surprised to see General Gregg have 100,000 majority over Wright.—Harrisburg Telegraph.

THE effects of the McKinley bill, as shown by the investigations made by the Associated Press, are not proving satisfactory to England. So, of course, the McKinley bill ought to go—that is to say, it ought to go on.

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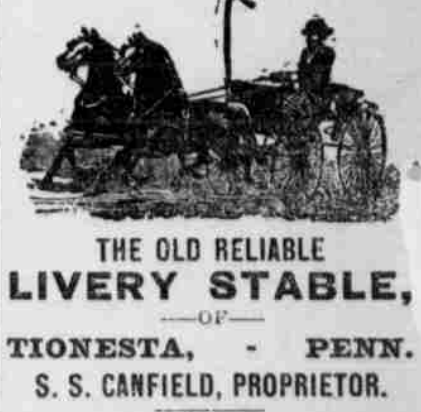
