GENERAL GREGG has been attending a reunion of the First Pennsylvania cavalry regiment. With the old boys the old General was first in war as he now is first in peace.

THE Allegheny Republicans say they have eighteen thousand majority for Gregg and Morrison. This means that the ticket will get seventy-five thousand majority in the State vote, and the probabilities are that it will reach one hundred thousand.

WITH Ohio, New York and Pennsylvania electing the Republican ticket this Fall—as now seems certain—all element of doubt in regard to next year's contest would seem to be like Paddy's hen—"when you put your hand on him he isn't there."

"THERE are no tin plate manufactories in this country," say the Mugwump papers; and yet the working men of Ohio are banqueting Major McKisley right along on American "tin plate dinners."

REMEMBER your taxes must be paid before Oct. 3 or you cannot vote in November. It is an important matter and requires prompt attention.

THERE is a searching party out for Boss Harry. He has gone under cover since the Democratic State Convention. Barring the Democratic party is an undertaking of great moment and involves considerable labor.

THE nomination of J. Sloat Fassett for Governor by the Republicans of New York last Wednesday was a good piece of political work. Mr. Fassett is an honorable gentleman, a thorough Republican, a man of unquestioned honesty who has gained the respect and esteem of political friend and foe.

THE New York Press, prints a statement prepared by Secretary Foster, showing the amount of money per capita in circulation in the United States for every year since 1859. In 1860 the per capita was \$13.85, and during the flush times of the war and at its close, the circulation per capita was \$20.57. To-day it is \$23.45 per capita, the highest it has been at any time within the thirty years.

THE mistakes our Democratic contemporaries throughout the country make is in supposing there is still a Democratic party in Pennsylvania. The Harrity machine has taken the place of what has been known heretofore as the Democratic party, and that will explain to the confused Democratic organs outside the State why the late convention, presented no declaration of principles. A great political party always has principles and purposes to declare which invite the support of the people.

Reciprocity Benefits.

Already the beneficial effects of the reciprocity treaty with the Latin-American republics may be seen. The Consul-General of Germany, stationed at San Jose, Costa Rica, states in an official letter to his Government, that there is "no doubt but that the extraordinary efforts which the industrial world of the United States, backed up by its Government, is making to increase its trade with Spanish-American countries is meeting with success. The difference in price, if there is any, is

more than compensated for by the attractive and handy get-up of American goods." Frank confession is good for the soul, and it is refreshing to hear that one foreign attaché has the courage to tell the truth. Germany and England carry on an immense commercial trade with its other European countries, with Asia, Africa and Australia. With this trade America does not interfere. It seems only just and reasonable, therefore, that the two American continents, so closely united geographically, should be bound together by political and friendly relations. It is most obvious that England's protests against the reciprocity treaty are all caused by her inordinate jealousy and love of gain.
