For a few weeks after the election every Republican paper in the United States blazed with eulogies of the great leader and the great chairman.

He has the genius to know Democratic instinct and Democratic wrong. He could detect them early and checkmate them quickly. There were no men on the National Committee willing to commit a penitentiary offense for the Republican party, and God grant there never shall be. There was and is no man on the National Committee who would not like to see bribery punished at the polls by the disfranchisement both of the bribe giver and bribe-taker. The whole Republican campaign lies in the education of the masses and the prevention of Democratic frauds.

"The time must come, in the years of reflection, when the Republican party will see that after he had won this great victory and the Democratic party sought to destroy him for fear that he might defeat it in another great victory, the masses and the papers of the party did not stand to his defense as they should have done. Cattle Ordinance.

Be it ordained by the Burgess and Town Council of Tionesta Borough, and it is hereby fracted by the authority of the

same. 1st. That from and after the first day of April, A. D. 1892, it shall not be lawful for any cows, hellers, horned or other cattle to be permitted to run at large in Tionesta Borough, except in being driven to and

to be permitted to run at large in Tionesta Borough, except in being driven to and from their places of pasture or keeping, but the same shall be put up and properly secured by the owners thereof, under a penalty of One Dollar for each and every animal so remaining at large, contrary to the provisions of this ordinance.

2d. It is hereby made the duty of the High Constable or Pound Master of said Borough to take up and impound any and all sue hanimals going at large as aforesaid in said Borough, when he shall notify the owner or owners thereof of such seizure and impounding, and if they shall not, within five days from such notice, reclaim their property by paying the above penalty and costs of keeping to the Burgess or some member of Council, then it shall be the duty of said officer (after having given ten days notice thereof) to sell said animal or animals in the usual manner of sales by Constables; the warrant therefor to be made by the Burgess under his hand and seal, upon complaint or information of the High Constable or Pound Master is hereby authorized, in case of sale, to retain all legal costs and fees, and the surplus, including the penalty aforesaid, in all cases to be paid to the Burgess, to be by him paid to the Borough Treasurer, and after payment of penalty and costs, to be disposed of by the Burgess and Council according to law. The High Constable or Pound Master shall be allowed a fee of fifty cents for each seizure, out of said penalty, and such costs for notices and saies as are allowed Constables by the laws of this Commonwealth for similar services.
