CLARKSON'S ESTIMATE OF SENATOR QUAY.

National Chairman John S. Clarkson has authorized a public expression of his estimate of Senator Quay's services to the Republican party in the Presidential campaign of 1888, and in a letter to Colonel Frank Willing Leach, assistant secretary of the committee, dated Asheville, N. C., March 5th, and given out for publication last Thursday, gives his reasons in full for styling Mr. Quay as "the greatest of political generals."

After an eloquent tribute to Senator Quay, whom he defines as "the greatest political general that the first century of partisan American politics has depicted," Mr. Clarkson does not hesitate to say that "the Republican party today has never fully appreciated their power or his service."

"No man can defeat the Democratic party of the United States without being trampled down in its malice if it be within the power of fury, hatred and calumny to accomplish it. No sooner was the election over than the plan of beating Quay to the earth was begun by the Democrats. It started in Tammany Hall, the most corrupt of political organizations known in America, and was seconded by the Democratic press of New York, the willing servants of Tammany Hall in all its meanness and malice."

"Soon this calumny was crossed with the Democratic venom, and the Republican press, instead of seeing the motive and striking down the malice, began to loiter and to hesitate and then to apologize, and finally some to turn about in the unworthy work of helping the Democratic party to destroy the great Republican fighter. The Democrats knew at once by the light of the election that they had more to fear from Quay than any other American. They fear him more to-day. They have followed him with unspitting malice, with unceasing calumny, and with a cruelty which only politics could either originate or perpetuate."

"It is much easier to shirk than to defend a friend in this latter time. I have none of such timidity. I call on the other men with whom I served with Mr. Quay, and all will bear witness that Mr. Quay's methods were honorable, straightforward, bold and manly. He has the genius to know Democratic instinct and Democratic wrong. He could detect them early and checkmate them quickly. There were no men on the National Committee willing to commit a penitentiary offense for the Republican party, and God grant there never shall be. There was and is no man on the National Committee who would not like to see bribery punished at the polls by the disfranchisement both of the bribe giver and bribe-taker. The whole Republican campaign lies in the education of the masses and the prevention of Democratic frauds."

"The time must come, in the years of reflection, when the Republican party will see that after he had won this great victory and the Democratic party sought to destroy him for fear that he might defeat it in another great victory, the masses and the papers of the party did not stand by his defense as they should have done. I am sure there is no member of this committee who would be false either to honor or friendship as not to hold up his hand in open defense of Mr. Quay in the national campaign, of his methods and of his victory. I talk of him only as we knew him when he came to us at national headquarters. I do not pretend to speak as to his affairs in Pennsylvania, for I know nothing of them. The people of that Christian Commonwealth judged him for all his weaknesses and rewarded him for all his strength."

"To the above just tribute the Philadelphia Inquirer adds: 'Quay gave up four months to that contest. It was a continuous vigil. It was hard work night and day. The victory was won, but the man who won it was broken in health. That health he has never fully recovered. When threatened with pneumonia the other day, he went to Florida. The attack came, and he barely escaped with his life. But for daring to take ordinary precautions his enemies have begun to hound him because of his absence from the Assembly. Against the Democratic methods of interest-keeping...'

fair play for every one. Such tactics are contemptuous, and unworthy of any paper claiming to be just."

Cattle Ordinance.

Be it ordained by the Burgess and Town Council of Tionesta Borough, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same: That from and after the first day of April, A. D. 1892, it shall not be lawful for any cows, heifers, horned or other cattle to be permitted to run at large in Tionesta Borough, except by being driven to and from their places of pasture or keeping, but the same shall be put up and properly secured by the owners thereof, under a penalty of One Dollar for each and every animal so remaining at large, contrary to the provisions of this ordinance...
