That absurd new ballot law is being tacked in Lackawanna county on the ground that it is unconstitutional, and two of the judges intimated sympathy with the movement to upset the law. There is no doubt whatever but that the matter will have to be settled by the Supreme Court, and if the bill is unconstitutional because special legislation it ought to be declared so at once before many counties go to a great expense in fitting up the election paraphernalia.

COLD COMFORT, says the Blizzard, is but all the Democrats can find in a New York World at the present time. Of Cleveland it says: "Those Democrats who are disheartened because they honestly and honorably believe that Mr. Cleveland should be nominated for the Presidency, and see in the peculiar conditions in New York make this unsafe, should have in the same article, we find this: 'se Democrats who are disheartened because they see in the organization of the anti-Hill convention a split will imperil New York, should that any candidate from outside might easily be stronger in setting the factions and carrying the tide than any man in it.'"

This Review of Reviews, a sharp publication, says that Mr. Hill is 49 years of age, of medium height, with compact, square shouldered figure. His complexion is waxen pale. His head round like a bullet, and shiny bald like a monk. His bluish gray eyes are deep set, restless and cunning, and cannot endure a steady gaze. He reads in American public life as the type of the successful practical politician in the lowest meaning of the words. In fact, he is the apotheosis of the ward heeler. He has never put his faith in the power of persuasion and enlightenment. In no campaign has he ever depended upon square advocacy of the platform or alleged principles of the party. His dependence has been placed almost exclusively upon organization and a skillful catering to the liquor men and other selfish interests.

COL. REISINGER, of the Meadville office, like all other straight haired consistent people, has no use for fakers and two for five returners, and is them off in the following paragraph: "When a newspaper wants to make itself as can always do it by speaking of it as 'the leading paper of its party.' When a preacher discovers that he knows it all, and turns around to upset the theology he has sworn to support, he is now as 'the leading clergyman of his conference.' It is very likely that a file of the Servant Herald of 1860 years ago were searched, and it would be announced that, 'Rev. It creates a smile to see the Democratic press weeping and wailing and tearing its hair over what it calls the republican gerrymander in Ohio. When the Democratic Ohio Legislature two years ago fashioned Congressional districts that threw big Republican counties into one district and cut Democratic counties into districts it gave them a majority in the Congressional delegation, there was a word against the infamy from Democratic papers. When the at McKinley was taken from a district that he could carry and was into a district overwhelmed Democratic for the express purpose of keeping him out of Congress the Democratic press had a word against the outrage? Not a word. They not only sided and abetted and rejoiced in it, and now when they should take it quickly to make a wry face. It makes enough to see them do so.

Hill Runs Against a Snag.

The anti Hill managers at Washington are making effectual use of the recent attempt to apply the Albany code of politics by the Empire State boss to the House Committee on Elections in its consideration of the Noyes-Rockwell case. The principle involved operated in favor of Noyes, the Republican contestant, as it did against Stewart, the Republican in the Pennsylvania case. In both contests the State law and its interpretation by the State courts governed the committee action. Being in favor of Noyes, Senator Hill sent for Democratic members of the committee to come to his hotel. Some of them when informed that Rockwell was his friend and wished him seated, demurred on the ground that they were acting in a judicial capacity. Then the Senator informed them that it must be done. Chairman O'Ferrall did not respond to the invitation, whereupon Hill went to see him, but the Virginian refused to comply and threatened to pull the Senator's nose if he were not cautious in his language. The committee—7 to 1—voted to seat Noyes, the Republican, thus emphasizing their rebuke of Senator Hill. In the House the case is likely to lead to a lively discussion. It is believed that the committee will be sustained by the combined vote of the anti Hill Democrats and Republicans.

And it is this man who as a candidate for President not only interferes with the duty of judge in a legislative body to which he does not belong, but who is preaching the doctrine that he end justifies the means in politics. It is this man who stole the State of New York for the Democrats and whom many Democrats, claiming to be law-abiding citizens, support and endorse for the highest office in the land.

WATERSON, the head and front of the Southern Democracy, has been talking again. He says his favorite Democratic candidate is Carlisle, of Kentucky. He regards him as the best equipped Democrat in public life. But he added that anybody would suit him if he didn't come from New York. He doesn't want a New Yorker, and says: Because the factions there have made the nomination of any New Yorker impossible. Gov. Hill has killed Mr. Cleveland, and in doing so he has almost killed himself. The nomination must come West, or go to Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, or Maryland. If we could not elect Mr. Cleveland in 1888, when he was in the White House and when we had all the other forms and shows of harmony in the State of New York, what chance should we have against the present vehement opposition? In the face of the New York schism it seems to me his nomination would be sheer suicide, and I have so much respect for his sense of dignity and honor that I take it for granted that he will in due time withdraw his name.
