Once more we are called upon to decide by our votes which of the two great political parties shall have control of the National Government for the next four years. Each party, in its platform of principles set forth, represent entirely opposite views upon many of the important questions of the day. The Republican party under the leadership of Benjamin Harrison stands squarely upon the platform adopted at Minneapolis, which declares in favor of a Protective Tariff, Reciprocity, Honest Money and a Free Ballot; a platform that declares in no uncertain tones in favor of protection to American labor and American manufactures—that is, that the tariff shall be so adjusted that our laboring men shall not be called upon to work for the starvation wages paid for the same kind of work in England. Whilst the Democratic party, under the leadership of Grover Cleveland, stands upon a platform adopted at Chicago, which comes out squarely for a Tariff for Revenue Only, which plainly means Free Trade! and makes no provision for the protection of labor or manufactures, but practically says to the laborer of this country that "you are receiving too great compensation for your labor. You should be satisfied with the same wages paid for labor in England, in order that we can buy our clothing cheaper!" for they do not pretend to say that anything the laboring man must buy to live upon will be any cheaper than it is now. They say that to undertake to protect labor or manufactures is unconstitutional!

Grover Cleveland and the Democratic party promise you, if placed in power, to repeal the ten per cent. tax placed on State banks by the Republican party, thereby substituting the old time State banks that were in vogue under the Democratic administration of affairs when the Republican party took possession in 1861, and which gave to the country the best money system in the world, and which we have to-day. Do you want to exchange our present system for the one in vogue then, when you didn't know that the dollar bill you had in your pocket at bed time would be worth a farthing when you arose in the morning? We hope not. The Democratic press and speakers everywhere are silent on this point, but persist in quibbling about the tariff plank, which they say does not mean free trade. So says Senator Hill, but Henry Waterson, who was most potent with the Southern Democrats in framing the platform, says it means just what it says. We wish to ask all young men who are casting the first Presidential ballot to look at this matter fairly; and we are glad to say to you that our platform of principles is not evasive and does not have to be apologized for nor explained away as does that of our Democratic friends. We therefore call upon every Republican in Forest County to do his whole duty. See to it that every vote is out, to the end that our principles shall be carried out. And we invite all young men and all others that believe in Protection to American labor, good sound money, and honest and fair dealing with the old soldier, to join us in carrying these principles to success. We expect every Republican to do his whole duty towards the election of our County Ticket. Capt. Haight is entitled to our undivided support and will surely be elected. Proclamation of General Election.

Whereas, in and by an act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "An Act to regulate the nomination and election of public officers, requiring certain expenses incident thereto to be paid by the several counties and certain other expenses to be paid by the Commonwealth, and punishing certain offenses in regard to such elections," passed the 19th day of June, A. D. 1891, it is made the duty of the Sheriff of every county within this Commonwealth to give public notice of the General Elections, and in such to enumerate:

I. The officers to be elected, and give a list of all the nominations, except for election officers and assessors made as provided in this act, and to be voted for in every county, as far as may be, in the form in which they shall appear upon the ballots, but the proclamations need not contain the names of any candidates but those to be voted for in such district. II. Designate the place at which the election is to be held. III. He shall also give notice that every person, excepting Justices of the Peace, who shall hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the government of the United States, or of this State or of any city or incorporated district, whether a commissioned officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent who is or shall be employed under the Legislative, Executive or Judiciary department of this State or of the United States, or of any city or incorporated district, and also that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature and of the select or common council of any city, or commissioners of any incorporated district, is, by law, incapable of holding or exercising at the same time, the office or appointment of Judge, inspector or clerk of any election of this Commonwealth, and that no inspector or clerk of any election shall be eligible to any office to be then voted for, except that of an election officer.

The Electors of Green township as follows: Those residing in the Election District of Guitonville, to-wit: those embraced in the following boundary, viz: Beginning at a point on the north corner of tract No. 658, thence south forty-five degrees west three hundred and twenty rods to the western corner of said tract, thence south forty-five degrees east along dividing line of tract No. 658 and 5501, thence to the north corner of tract No. 5501, thence by the southeast line of tracts Nos. 5503 and 5504 to a point on the north line of tract No. 5504, thence southwesterly to the northwest corner of tract No. 3330, and southeast corner of tract 5502 on the Clarion county line, thence by the north line of the northeast corner of Clarion county, thence north by the Jenks township line to where the said Jenks township line crosses the northeast line of tract No. 5502, thence north by the northeast line of Green township to the place of beginning, shall vote at the School House at Guitonville. The Electors of Howe township residing in the Election District of West Howe, to-wit: Those residing within the territory embraced by the following boundary lines, to-wit: Beginning at a point in the Warren and Forest county line to the northwest corner of Warrant No. 3198, thence south along the eastern boundary lines of warrants 2736, 2968 and 2464, to the Elk county line; thence south along the eastern boundary line to the northwest corner of Warrant No. 2968, thence east along the north line of subdivisions 69, 68, 65, 64 and 61 of warrant 2968 and subdivisions 51, 52, 53, 54 and 55 of warrant 2736, an undivided corner, to the northwest corner of Warrant 2968 and the north line of warrant 2464 to the Elk county line, the place of beginning, shall vote at John Black's Carpenter Shop, Erie. The Electors of Howe township residing in the Election District of West Howe, to-wit: Those residing west of the above described Election District of West Howe, shall vote at the Ballow School House. The Electors of Jenks township as follows: Those residing in the Election District of Byrom, to-wit: those embraced in the following boundary, viz: Beginning at the northeast corner of tract No. 4133 and the northwest corner of tract No. 4134, thence northwesterly to the southeast corner of tract No. 3654, thence along the western line of tracts Nos. 3564, 3540, 3544 and 3501 to the Jenks township line, thence east by the same to the northwest corner of Jenks township, thence south by the east line of Jenks township to the southeast corner thereof, thence west to the southeast corner of tract No. 4129, thence north to the northeast corner of said Warrant, thence west to beginning, shall vote at the School House at Byromtown. The Electors of Jenks township residing outside of the territory embraced in the above described Election District of Byrom, shall vote at Central Hall in Marienville. I also make known the following provisions of the new Constitution of Pennsylvania: ARTICLE VIII. SUFFRAGE AND ELECTIONS. SEC. 1. Every male citizen twenty-one years of age, possessing the following qualifications, shall be entitled to vote at elections: First.—He shall have been a citizen of the United States at least one month. Second.—He shall have resided in the State one year (or, if having previously been a qualified elector or native born citizen of the State he shall have removed therefrom and returned, then six months,) immediately preceding the election. Third.—He shall have resided in the election district where he offers to vote at least two months immediately preceding the election. Fourth.—If twenty-two years of age or upwards, he shall have paid within two years a State or county tax which shall have been assessed at least two months and paid at least one month before election. SEC. 2. The General election shall be held annually on the Tuesday next following the first Monday of November, but the General Assembly may, by law, fix a different day, two-thirds of all the members of each House consenting thereto. Notice is hereby given, that any person excepting Justices of the Peace, who shall hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the United States, or this State, or any city or incorporated district, whether commissioned officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent who is or shall be employed under the legislative, executive or judiciary department of this State, or in any city, or in any incorporated district, and also that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature, or of the select or common council of any city, or commissioners of any incorporated district, is by law incapable of holding or exercising at the time, the office or appointment of Judge, inspector or clerk of any election in this Commonwealth, and that no inspector, judge or other officer of such election shall be eligible to be then voted for. The Judges of the aforesaid districts shall respectively take charge of the certificates of return of the election of the several districts, and produce them at the Prothonotary's office in the Borough of Tionesta, as follows: "All Judges living within twelve miles of the Prothonotary's office, or within twenty-four miles if their residence be in a town, village or city upon the line of a railroad leading to the county seat, shall before two o'clock p. m., on WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER NINTH, 1892, and at the judges shall before twelve o'clock, m., on THURSDAY, NOVEMBER TENTH, 1892, deliver said returns, together with the return notes, to the Prothonotary of the Court of Common Pleas of Forest county, which said return shall be filed, and the day and hour of filing marked thereon, and shall be preserved by the Prothonotary for public inspection.
