Second.—He shall have resided in the State one year, (or, if having previously been a qualified elector or native born citizen of the State he shall have remeved thereform and returned, then six months,) immediately preceding the election.

Third.—He shall have resided in the election district where he offers to vote at least two months immediately preceding the election.

Fourth.—If twenty-two years of age or upwards, he shall have paid within two years a State or county tax which shall have been assessed at least two months and have been assessed at least two. paid at least one month before election.

Sec. 2. The General election shall be held annually on the Tuesday next following the first Monday of November, but the General Assembly may, by law, fix a different day, two-thirds of all the members of each House consenting thereto.
