They come from all parts of the State, which shows the demand for his services are not of a local character, but his popularity extends into every nook and corner of the Commonwealth. Thompson it will be, and a good, safe candidate he'll make.

Judge Fell Strongly Endorsed.

"The undersigned members of the Philadelphia Bar respectfully urge upon the Delegates to the Republican State Convention that the selection of the candidate for Judge of the Supreme Court be made from the City of Philadelphia.

"The vacancy on the Supreme Bench to be filled at the November election, was caused by the resignation of a judge elected from this city, and Philadelphia, while furnishing the much greater portion of the business which comes before the Court, has now but one representative on the Bench.

"We further earnestly recommend the selection of the Hon. D. Newlin Fell, who for sixteen years has been a Judge of the Court of Common Pleas of this city, and who has twice been elected to the Bench on the nomination of both political parties.

"Judge Fell is old enough in judicial experience to be fitted for the Supreme Court, and young enough in years to give promise that he can, without impairment of his usefulness, serve a full term.

"His long service on the Bench in this city has been marked by ability, learning, integrity, courage and thorough fairness and impartiality."

The above endorsement of one of the purest and ablest Judges in the State is signed by over six hundred of the leading lawyers of his native city, and the unanimity with which his candidacy is received by all fractions of the party at his home shows that his majority in the Quaker City would be little less than phenomenal were he to be the candidate this fall, and there is scarcely any doubt but that the convention will name him, perhaps by acclamation.

A ONE-SIDED FIGHT.

The Philadelphia North American, one of the leading Republican papers of that city, contains the following article on the candidacy of our popular neighbor, Speaker Thompson, who is having very smooth sailing in his canvass:

As the time for holding the Republican State Convention draws near, interest in the State Treasurership contest increases. The only candidates for the nomination who appear to be in the fight at all are Hon. Caleb C. Thompson, of Warren, who has presided over the House for two sessions, and Benjamin F. Heywood, of Mercer. The fact that Judge Fell, of Philadelphia, will undoubtedly be nominated to fill the vacancy on the Supreme bench caused by the retire-

ment of Justice Paxson removes ex-Senator Harlan, of Chester, from the contest, as candidates from adjoining counties would not be selected for the two leading places on the ticket.

It has been said that Speaker Thompson's candidacy will interfere with the gubernatorial chances of Congressman Stone two years hence, both coming from the same county. This theory is circulated mainly by the friends of Mr. Heywood, who hope to thus belittle the chances of Mr. Thompson. The absurdity of this statement is at once apparent when it is shown that Congressman-at-Large McDowell, who headed the ticket last fall, not only hails from the same town, Sharon, Mercer county, that Mr. Heywood hails from. In addition, it is well known here that Mr. McDowell expects to be a candidate next year to succeed himself, as it is apparent that no Congressional Apportionment bill will be passed this year to render Congressman-at-Large unnecessary.

Friends of Congressman Stone assert that every candidate should "stand on his own bottom," and that the nomination of Speaker Thompson this summer will not necessarily interfere with Mr. Stone's chances when the gubernatorial Convention meets almost two years hence.

The serious illness of Speaker Thompson's wife has prevented that gentleman from giving much attention to his candidacy. Every possible available hour has been spent at her bedside.

Nevertheless his friends have been active and they assert that two-thirds of the delegates will be for their favorite if pledges count for anything. Philadelphia promises a solid delegation for him, as does also Pittsburgh. In addition, the influences of nearly every member of the Legislature will be thrown into the scales for him, and altogether it may be said that Mr. Thompson appears to be the favorite in the race.
