The sole and belt leather manufacturers now have a combine with \$120,000.00 capital. And this in the face of Cleveland's inaugural protest. Such disregard of the warnings of the Chief Executive is perfectly reprehensible.

Mrs. DEFEW, wife of Chauncey M. Deway, died at her residence in New York, at 12:30, last Sunday afternoon. Although seriously ill for some time the sudden termination of her illness was unexpected, and her husband has since been prostrated by the shock.

The killing of Carlyle W. Harris by electricity, at Sing Sing, for the poisoning of his young wife, took place Monday. The case has excited public interest from start to finish. It is believed by many that the condemned man was innocent, although the evidence against him was strong and quite conclusive. His stout denial of guilt from the first is doubtless what has led many to believe him innocent.

That champion liar, the New York World, says there is a big row brewing between the Harrison and anti-Harrison factions, and that it is likely to burst forth at the Republican League meeting in Louisville this week. As usual the World prints what it would like to see, and not what is likely to come to pass. There are no Harrison and anti-Harrison factions in the Republican party. There is a Republican party, but it is not split up like the Democracy into Tammany, Whitney, Mugwump, anti-snapper and various other factions. This will be seen when the result of the next election is announced.

EX-SENATOR JOHN J. INGALLS is writing up Chicago and the Fair for a syndicate of newspapers, and what he says is well worth reading, even if one does not agree with the great vitriol slinger. He draws this pen picture of Chicago as it is at present: "The last municipal administration was ostensibly one of decorum and law, but there is no European capital where vice and crime are more insolently and shamelessly audacious than here, nor where there is more security from immunity. Highway robbers ply their vocation as dashing as Dick Turpin at Blackheath. Sluggars and sandbaggers rob their victims in the heart of the city. Burglaries are so common that they have ceased to attract notice. Pickpockets, thieves, fakirs, crooks, bunco steers and green goods men are holding carnival." This is the feast to which Carter Harrison and his merry crew of municipal bigrands invites the world civilized and uncivilized, the acceptance of which invitation involves the carrying of one's life in one's hands.

IN AN attempt by some people to "get square," an investigation of the Warren Hospital was ordered by the legislature, based upon allegations of bad treatment of a man named Peart, who, when he had the opportunity of having his case heard by a committee, declined to do so upon the ground that the committee had no authority to subpoena witnesses. When a thin excuse such as this moves a legislative body to appoint an investigating committee, the disinterested are excused, if they believe that some other motive than that of the public good is back of the appointment. It is a satisfaction to learn that Governor Pattison has promptly put his foot on the "resolution," and giving the legislature to very emphatically understand in his veto message, that he doesn't believe in wasting money in investigating charges that have already been branded by a competent committee of honorable men as false, libellous and defamatory. Persons who make charges of a sensational character like the ones referred to should be held strictly responsible for their utterances, and if found to have no reasonable grounds for their charges should be made to suffer for their fabrications. This would curtail a heap of nonsensical investigation and save a big waste of the State's revenues.

Trailed in the Dust.

Hon. Charles W. Stone, the able and talented gentleman who represents Warren in Congress, was one of the speakers at the Republican tariff club banquet in Pittsburg, and replied to the toast of "The United States." In the course of his address, and it was just such an one as a man of Mr. Stone's ability can make, eloquent and patriotic, he referred to our great and growing population, saying this incidentally: "Two months ago, when a Republican administration raised the American flag and extended American protection over the beautiful and fertile Sandwich Islands, we regarded with satisfaction the probable and peaceful acquisition of these gems of the Pacific; and yet since that time we have added to our population twice the number of people we would have gained by the acquisition of those islands. Even since a confederate Democrat hauled down the stars and stripes at Honolulu, this Nation has gained by natural growth as many people as the Sandwich Islands contain."

This was a shot direct at Cleveland and Blount, but Mr. Stone is a man of courage and does not hesitate to say what he thinks. The hauling down of the stars and stripes in Honolulu by a Confederate Democrat, at Cleveland's request, will never be sanctioned by the people of this country.—Harrisburg Telegraph.

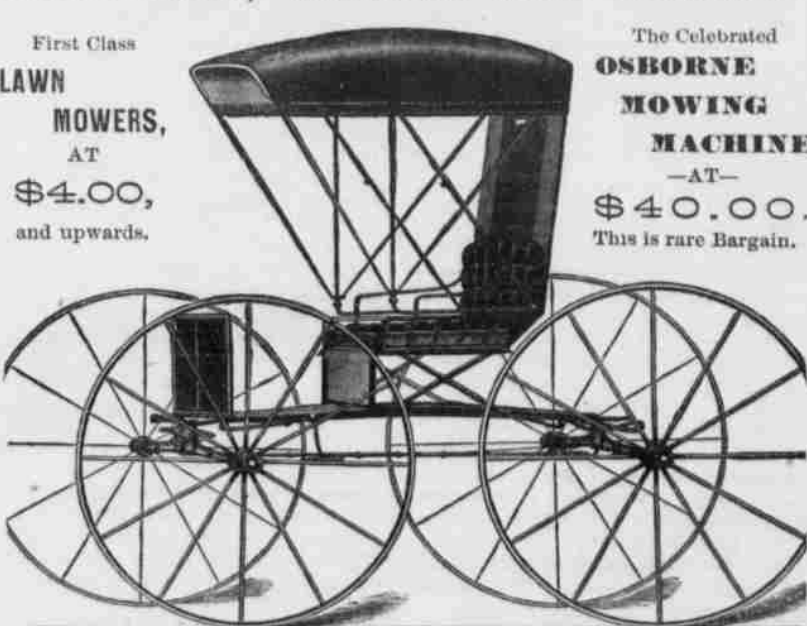
