Be it ordained by the Burgess and Town Council of the Borough of Tionesta, and it is hereby enacted by authority of the

Sec. 1.—That it shall be the duty of the owner or occupant of any let or lots or parts thereof within the limits of said Borough to keep the side walks of his, her or their respective properties free from show, and upon his, her or their failure to do so for a period of six working hours after a fall of soon the present ing hours after a fall of snow, the person or persons so failing shall be liable to a fine of fifteen (15) cents for each and ev-ery vod or parts of rods of such sidewalk n which snow remains after the expiration of said six working hours as afore aid.
Sec. 2.—It shall be the duty of the High

Constable to remove any snow from the side walks if it is not done by the owners or occupants in accordance with Sec-tion 1 of this ordinance, and report the same to the Council at its first regular meeting thereafter, and such fine or pen-alty if not paid within ten (10) days shall be collected as provided by act of assem-bly of April 3d, 1831.
