A large body of delegates met at New Orleans, Monday, of last week, and made an appeal to the Senate to save the sugar producers from the dire disaster threatened by the Democratic Congress. Representatives were present at this meeting from the Louisiana Sugar and Rice Exchange, Bureau of Freight and Transportation, Stock Exchange, Mechanics' Dealers' and Lumbermen's Exchange, Wholesale Grocers' Association, Clearing House Cotton Exchange, Steamboatmen's Association, Produce Exchange, Board of Trade and Trunk Railroad lines. There was no division of opinion among them and a resolution was adopted with a preamble reciting that on the faith of the bounty and its promised continuance for fifteen years a large amount of capital has been invested in the production of sugar by new and improved methods of agriculture and manufacture; therefore
