#### **Republican** Committee Meeting.

At the call of Chairman J. Woods the Republican County Committee met at the Sheriff's office at the court house, Monday evening at 7:30. The Chairman called the committee to order and appointed Leon Watson secretary. He stated the object of the meeting to be to appoint a day for the holding of the Republican Primary election, as well as for the transaction of such other business as might come up. After some suggestions a motion was carried naming Saturday, May 12th, 1894.





The Effects are Far Reaching.

At a meeting of the Pittsburg Coal Exchange a few days ago resolutions were adopted earnestly protesting against the meddling with the sugar industry of Louisiana, as contemplated by the Wilson bill. One naturally wonders why the coal men or any other Pittsburg industry should be interested in southern sugar en-

terprise, especially when so far removed from this locality. But the reasons will be more fully comprehended when it is understood that Pittsburg coal operators ship annually to New Orleans between 25,000, 000 and 30,000,000 bushels of coal, by far the greater portion of which enters into sugar industry, and until the tariff on sugar is definitely settled they cannot with any degree of certainty expect much from that section, and they don't propose to ship their coal there with no prospect that there will be money to pay for it when it arrives. And thus it is seen how far reaching the sugar bounty or tariff becomes. And this is not all. 


