By virtue of an act of Assembly entitled "An Act to regulate the collection of taxes on unseated lands," approved the 28th day of June, A. D., 1887, interest will be charged on 1892 taxes from January 1, 1893, to date of payment, and on 1893 taxes from January 1, 1894, to date of payment, at the rate of six per cent per annum.
