Mr. Cook's Candidacy.

And now to-wit: May 21, A. D., 1894, Petition presented; Notice to be given the husband, Wm. Y. Siggins, either personally, or by publication once a week for four weeks, in a weekly newspaper of Forest County, that the same will be considered by the Court on the 3d Tuesday of July next, when a person interested may show cause, if any they have, why the prayer of the petitioner shall not be granted.
