THE World's Fair stockholders have received a ten per cent. dividend, and there's more to follow. It was not such a bad investment, after all.

F. A. WEAVER, Editor of the Brookville Republican, won the Jefferson county nomination for Congress at the Republican primaries in that county last Saturday. Mr. Weaver deserves the district nomination.

THE Democratic primaries in Clarion county last Saturday resulted in the nomination of J. M. Fox for Congress, Geo. F. Kribbs being defeated for re-nomination. A. W. Smiley and J. H. Martin were nominated for Assembly.

THE reputable Democrats in Breckinridge's district have served notice that if he is nominated they will support Major Henry Clay McDowell, the Republican who will be nominated and who will make the run. This means the election of a Republican from the district, and no honest citizen need fear that Major McDowell will disgrace the district after the manner of Breckinridge.

It looks now as if the administration and anti-administration forces in the Democratic State Convention will lock horns on the gubernatorial nomination, the former voting for Attorney General Hensel and the latter for James Guffey, the millionaire oil operator. Anybody who has watched the drift of affairs knows how the fight will end. Mr. Hensel will be nominated by a majority that will simply annihilate Colonel Guffey, and the same old fight will be on again, but fiercer than ever. Mr. Harrity will run the convention, because he will have the delegates, and the anti-Harrity people will not have the ghost of a show.

THE legislative investigating committee in New York, which is probing the rotten Tammany police force, has discovered a new kind of hand-shake. A witness testified that he kept a dive that was under police protection, and once a month the police captain of the precinct would call on him, drink a bottle of his wine, shake hands with him and depart. But, when he shook hands with the captain the dive keeper always left a \$50 bill in the captain's hand. It was an agreement between them that by the payment of this \$50 per month the dive keeper was protected. No matter what other houses were raided and the proprietors arrested, this particular man suffered immunity and he proceeded with his nefarious business feeling perfectly safe. This is only one of a hundred cases of a similar character, and is chiefly remarkable for the new kind of hand-shake it developed.

THE cost per capita of maintenance and education of the pupils in the Soldiers' Orphans' Schools of the State for the year ending May 31st, 1894, was \$139.96, or four cents less than the per capita allowed by law. The average attendance in the schools during the year was 558. There are now 712 pupils in the schools and thirteen others provided for by the commission in schools outside of those under its jurisdiction. A number of discharges will occur during July and August, the vacation period, and the commission desires to have all the applicants for admission made as early as possible in order that it may be enabled to decide as to the continuance of all the schools now in existence during the current year. A circular letter has been issued by the commission to the Grand Army posts of the State stating that with proper attention every soldier's or sailor's orphan can be cared for in the schools now in existence, but un-

less applications are received in sufficient quantity during another year one at least will be closed. Children eligible for admission must be between five and fourteen years of age. Harrisburg Telegraph.

THE Iron Age states that the domestic tin-plate manufacturers report an active demand for every pound they are able to produce, whether of bright or roofing tin. The quality of American tin-plates generally is so good that consumers prefer them and ask for them, and take imported plates with reluctance, if they cannot get the domestic. The wages for this class of labor in the United States is about double that paid in Great Britain. There appears to be continued steady work for all. One of the largest manufacturers—Messrs. N. & G. Taylor Co., of Philadelphia—state that their output last week was the largest since they started their works about two years ago. And yet the tin-plate liar continues to tell his fake lie about not being able to make tin-plate in this country.

Ex-Congressman Bayne Ends His Life.

In a fit of despondency resulting from a long and incurable illness, and depressed by a sudden and violent attack of dangerous symptoms, Thomas M. Bayne, the well known ex-Representative of the Allegheny district in Congress, at a quarter after 10 o'clock last Saturday morning forestalled the end by sending a bullet through his head, killing himself instantly. The occurrence took place at Col. Bayne's handsome home in the city of Washington. With the exception of the servants, his wife being temporarily absent in Philadelphia, Mr. Bayne was alone in the house. About eighteen months ago he was induced to take a voyage around the world, and when he returned last July it appeared he had improved much. This gain was but temporary, however, and he suffered greatly from fits of depression consequent upon the mutations of his disease, which was consumption.

Colonel Bayne was fifty-eight years of age last Thursday. He entered the Union Army in July, 1862, as Colonel of the One Hundred and Thirty-sixth Pennsylvania Volunteers, which he commanded during its nine months' service. At the close of the war he was admitted to the Allegheny County bar and in 1870 was elected District Attorney. In 1874 he was elected to Congress from the Twenty-third District, serving until 1890, when he voluntarily retired on account of ill health.

AN ORDINANCE.

To provide for proper house drainage and sewerage of houses and streets in the Borough of Tionesta, Forest County, Pennsylvania, and for the proper disposal of sewage matter.

Be it ordained and enacted by the Borough and Town Council of the Borough of Tionesta, Forest County, Pennsylvania, in accordance with the Acts of Assembly in such cases made and provided, and it is hereby ordained and enacted by the authority of the same; that proper main and branch underground sewers be laid on Elm, Vine, Court, William, Helen, May, Bridge, Walnut and Highland Streets in the said Borough of Tionesta, with proper places for the connections of house drains, for the carrying off and disposal of all such sewage matter and house drainage; and that all owners of lots be required and they are hereby required to connect their house drains with said mains or branches thereof, of said sewers, in the manner provided by and under the direction of the Council and the Board of Health of the said Borough; such sewerage to be put in from time to time, and in accordance with the plans and specifications adopted by the said Council, provided, in case any property owner refuses to connect his or her house drains with said sewers after 30 days notice from the said council so to do, the said Borough, by its council, shall have the power to make such connections and charge the cost and expense thereof to the properties and the owners thereof, which cost and expense, together with 25 per cent, as a penalty, may be collected by an action of assumpsit or by filing a lien against the respective properties and collect the same as mechanics liens are by law collected. The above Ordinance was duly passed by the said Council of Tionesta Borough on the 19th day of June, A. D. 1894.

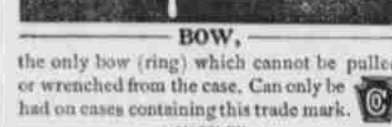
