It is said that the present drouth has caused the outbreak of the disease. The scanty berhage in the pasture field causes the cattle to eat leaves and weeds as well as grass, and this, coupled with the insufficient supply of water, in the majority of the pastuse fields, has been too much for the constitution of the average cow." We have heard of no complaints of this nature from any of our people, but it might be well to keep a lookout for the disease among the cattle.
