spectator. These gentlemen informally talked the situation over with representatives from Elk, Cameron and Clarion counties. Everybody was in good humor, no one having "blood in his eye," and all were on hand simply to do the best for the district, regardless of personalities. With this sort of feeling it was not possible for any ill feeling to come up. Mr. Craig was not anxious for the nomination and he and his conferees felt very friendly to Forest and to Dr. Towler. Cameron county had no candidate and was there simply for the best to be done, and they felt friendly to Forest and the Doctor.

Mr. Baker, Elk county's candidate is a splendid fellow and a man of ability, but even Elk and Mr. Baker was only on hand for the best for the party. It was well known, or as the politicians say, "an open secret," that Dr. Towler could have had the nomination with very little effort. But (and herein consists the secret of party success) Dr. Towler and his friends were firmly convinced that the candidate that could poll the most votes should be nominated, and the logical candidate under all circumstances was Mr. Craig, and to Mr. Craig it went unaniously, after a few complimentary remarks.

Mr. Craig being introduced made a happy little speech and promised to do his best to win. Dr. Towler congratulated the convention on its choice, and said that in his view it was the strongest that could be made. Every one present agreed to this, and the convention was declared by the chairman, Mr. McNarney, of Cameron, adjourned. So began and so ended, perhaps one of the most pleasant nominating conventions that was ever held in this section.

W. C. ARNOLD, ESQ.

William Carlyle Arnold, of DuBois, who was nominated by the Republican conference of the 28th district for Congress, is the son of the well known merchant Samuel Arnold, now of Curwensville, but formerly of Luthersburg, Clearfield county, and was born in the latter place in 1851. He was educated at the public schools of Curwensville, and finished at the historic Phillips Academy at Andover, Mass. While yet a very young man he entered the Curwensville National Bank, and served several years there as teller. In 1873 he commenced the study of law in Clearfield, and was duly admitted to practice in June 1875.

His career as a lawyer is familiar to our people, and has been both brilliant and successful. His exceeding cleverness of resource, his ready eloquence, and his knowledge of men and affairs give him great influence with a jury, and he has been on the winning side of many important cases. He has almost from the beginning of his practice, taken high rank in the profession, and is noted as one of the finest speakers at the Bar.

In 1874 he was married to Miss Jane Patton Irvin, daughter of the late William Irvin of Curwensville. His family consists of three sons and a daughter.

Mr. Arnold spent a few years in Huron, where he has made investments in real estate in the expectation that Huron would be selected as the capital of South Dakota. His hopes, however, in this regard were disappointed, and he returned to Clearfield county, locating in the thriving city of DuBois. Since his return he has been enjoying a large practice, and his management of the cases entrusted to him has added to his reputation.

In politics Mr. Arnold has always been a staunch Republican, and has eloquently advocated Republican principles on the stump in every campaign since 1876. His genial manners, his ready sympathies, and his generous heart, render him popular with all classes, and his neighbors, Republican and Democrat alike, are his hearty friends and well wishers.

It is to be hoped that he will be able to meet the people of all parts of this district, for he is one who favorably impresses all who come in contact with him.—*Raftsmen's Journal*, Clearfield, Pa.
