NEW BETHLEHEM HONORED.

A Local Journal at Mr. Craig's Home Gives Our Senatorial Candidate A Hearty Endorsement.

On Thursday, August 23, the Republican Senatorial Conference of the Thirty-eighth Senatorial District met at Ridgway and unanimously nominated Clarion county's candidate, our honored citizen, John F. Craig. Mr. Craig was enthusiastically received by our citizens upon his return as the next Senator from this district.

Mr. Craig is quite well known throughout the district and is eminently fitted for that position:—a man now ripe in years and experience. Mr. Craig is no politician, never having held an office, we think, except that of Poor Overseer, which office he has filled for nearly twenty years successively, and has never allowed any worthy person to want. He has been an extensive manufacturer and merchant in this county and Armstrong during most of his life, having been one of the builders and owners of the well known Red Bank flouring mills here, one of the most modern and perfect plants of the kind in Western Pennsylvania, and the manager of the woolen mills here, whose products have achieved a reputation under his management not only at home but in the markets of New York and Pittsburgh second to none. Mr. Craig is a shrewd, practical business man and has been very successful in all his undertakings. If you want to know the kind of a man he is ask his employees. Always honest, a gentleman who understands his business and attends to it to the minutest details. He has been easy and has extended an extensive credit to miners and laborers of all classes and never distressed any one by collecting an account by execution or force.

He is a well educated man, being a graduate of Jefferson College, and spent some years as a teacher in high schools and academies. He was admitted to the bar of Clarion county in 1858, and, although not practicing, his counsel and advice are sought for by all classes and thought to be as safe as any lawyer's. No man in our section understands the wants of all classes, the laboring men included, better, and we know he is full of sympathy with them. He is a strong Republican, but is always courteous to Democrats, among whom he has many warm friends. He is respected by all classes, hence we think he is the right kind of a man for the place. He is honest, practical, fearless, fair and capable, and in every way fitted for the high office to which he has been nominated.

In Vermont, in 1892, the Republicans polled 37,992 votes, or 68.12 per cent of the whole; in 1894 they polled 42,780 votes or 74.30 per cent. of the whole. In 1892 the Democrats polled 16,325 votes or 29.27 per cent. of the whole; and in 1894 only 14,120 votes, or 24.53 per cent. of the whole. The Republicans made a gain of over 13 per cent. and the Democrats lost over 14 per cent. of their vote in 1892. In the State of Maine the Republicans polled 62,923 votes in 1892, or 54.05 per cent. of the whole; in 1894 they polled 71,500 votes, or 64.42 per cent. of the whole. In 1892 the Democrats polled 38,044 votes, or 41.26 per cent. of the whole, and 1894 only 33,500 votes, or 30.18 per cent. of all the votes cast. This comparison is made with the vote cast for President in 1892. If compared with the vote for Governor in 1890, a very much larger Republican gain would be shown.

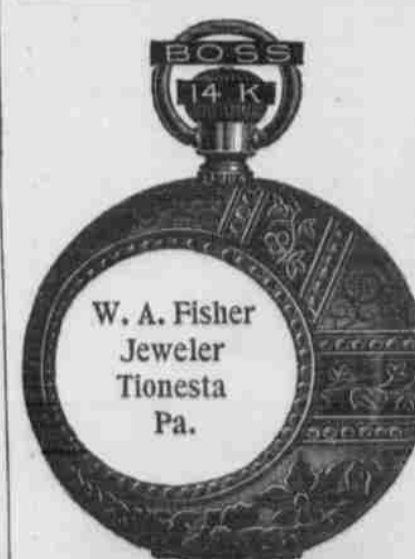
