The Chamber of Commerce of London, England, is to banquet Congressman William L. Wilson on September 27th. This is eminently proper and shows that the Englishmen appreciate a kindness. Wilson is and has been the Englishman's friend, and a banquet to him by the English business men and manufacturers, represented in the Chamber of Commerce, is among the things to be expected. The American workman and the American manufacturer will please take notice.

The Republicans of New York, at their State convention held at Saratoga last week, nominated Ex-Vice President, Levi P. Morton for Governor, and State Senator Charles T. Saxton for Lt. Governor. The ticket is one of the strongest that could be named, and gives the greatest satisfaction. That it will be elected by a large majority, is conceded by the Democrats in the significant fact that, after a long interview with Senators Hill and Murphy, Governor Flower has notified his friends that he will not accept a re-nomination.

The Philadelphia Ledger supported McAleer for Congress in the Third district. Time was when the Ledger took an interest in Philadelphia institutions and did what it could to advance them. Since it became the Cleveland court organ and apologist for free traders it has lost its regard for Philadelphia and seeks to put men into office who would strike down by their votes in Congress that which is essentially Philadelphian—her factories, mills, workshops and homes. The Ledger is fast losing its reputation for fair play, and fast gaining notoriety as a toady.

GENERAL HASTINGS' tour of the State has been one of continuous ovation since he started on his trip. Wherever he has spoken he has been met by monstrous audiences and all of the most enthusiastic order. He stopped an hour or two in Oil City, Thursday, while en route to Kittanning, and was met by a large delegation of enthusiastic friends of all parties. In noting the General's visit the Blizard has this to say of him: "The General is one of the comparatively few candidates a meeting of whom does not detract from his standing in the estimation of those whom he meets. Large, good looking, affable and pleasant spoken, he has the bearing of a distinguished man, and would be singled out as one in any gathering. He is sure to make friends wherever he goes."

The defeat of Democratic Congressman McAleer for re-nomination in the third Philadelphia district by the HARRY machine, and the terrible denunciation of said machine by gubernatorial Candidate Slingerly in his Philadelphia Record, is the sensation of the hour, and greater consternation has the party never suffered

than has been caused by this event. Mr. Slingerly, who has been working for harmony since his nomination, comes out boldly and tells his party that "it may as well be confessed now as sixty days hence," that its action "will thoroughly demoralize, dishearten and defeat Democratic effort to poll a full vote in that city this November," and says that "100,000 Democrats have allowed themselves to be hand-cuffed and delivered into the control of a few contemptible ringsters, rosters and ruffians."

The New York Republicans have done the wise thing in nominating Hon. Levi P. Morton for Governor. Mr. Morton is a clean-handed man, a man of great ability, he has not antagonized any of the elements of his party, and altogether his nomination is the best that could be made. Of late years the Republicans of New York have been making some very rocky nominations at the dictation of Tom Platt, but this year Platt was shrewd enough to see that the popular demand was for Mr. Morton, and he got on the people's train. Mr. Morton's majority will be something handsome.

The following is a sample of the kinds of benefits to accrue to the country from the Free Trade tariff:

Spanish-American ports are now practically closed to many of our agricultural products. Official notice has been received at Havana from the minister of colonies, at Madrid, that the duties ruling before the reciprocity treaty went into effect, should be restored. The trade created under the McKinley bill amounted to something like \$20,000,000. Preparations have been made at Halifax, Quebec and other British ports to take hold of the trade hitherto enjoyed by the United States.

In his answer to Factor Inspector Watchorn as to what is the proper age for a child to go to work in a mill or factory Terrence V. Powderly, the labor leader says that for moral, physical and economic reasons the child should not enter the treadmill of competition before fifteen years of age. Furthermore, Mr. Powderly thinks that the school house should know all children, and it should not be a passing acquaintance either; the education should be well under way before the coal breaker, the factory or mill should overshadow the school house. The education of America is paramount to everything else. Where there is ignorance there is mischief. Educate the children, then teach them trades—but educate them.
