GOLD AT A HIGH PRICE.

Mr. August Belmont in a long interview on the recent gold purchases by the Government says the gold will stay in the Treasury. How is this possible unless the Secretary of the Treasury is given some authority in the matter of holding and protecting it, and unless there is a surplus revenue? Europe is willing to pay a premium on gold and the United States government has just paid a most extravagant price for the metal. It is a most valuable commodity.

For \$62,000,000 gold the government traded \$62,000,000 4 per cent. bonds, the market price of which is 119 1/2, and it is stipulated that only half the gold shall come from abroad. Therefore for \$31,000,000 of foreign gold and \$31,000,000 of domestic the United States has obligated itself to pay \$62,000,000 principal and \$74,000,000 in interest in round numbers. These figures and the syndicate's prospective profits indicate what gold is worth and how difficult it is to get it.

Mr. Belmont estimates the syndicates profits at 4 and 5 per cent. The thirty year 4s cost the syndicate not 104 1/2. The 12 1/2 year 5s are selling in the open market at 110 1/2. At this rate the thirty year 4s are worth 119 1/2, and the market price of the United States bonds is lower than usual, having suffered for three months from the mal-administration of Mr. Carlisle, as the New York bankers can explain. If these figures are correct the profits of the syndicate are more than 15 per cent. instead 4 or 5 percent, as stated by Mr. Belmont.

THE bill providing for another edition of the bird book has passed both houses of the legislature and now awaits the signature of the Governor to make it operative. Before final passage the bill was amended as to make the total cost of printing and binding not more than \$25,000, and providing that the contract for printing should be let to the lowest responsible bidder. This factually squelches the charge that this popular book was to cost the State over \$100,000, and takes away a good deal of the cheap thunder which many of the fault-finding newspapers of the country were getting out of the thing ever since the proposition was before the legislature.

EX QUEEN LIL, informally abdicating the throne from which she was lifted a long while ago, declares: "I do hereby forever absolve all persons, whether in the Hawaiian Islands or elsewhere, from all and every manner of allegiance or duty to me." What a load the declaration lifts from President Cleveland and his gifted freak of a premier, Secretary Gresham! For long, weary months the large and lazy Lil has set upon them like an inky nightmare.—Franklin News.
