Mr. August Belmont in a long interview on the recent gold punchases by the Government says the gold will stay in the Treasury. How is thipossible unless the Secretary of the Treasury is given some authority in the matter of holding and protecting it, and unless there is a surplus revenue? Europe is willing to pay a premium on gold and the United States government has just paid a most extravagant price for the metal. It is a most valuable commodity.




