M., and proceed to elect one person for Judge, and two persons for Clerks who shall form a Board of Elections to receive votes and determine who are the proper persons to vote and who shall hold the polls open until 7 o'clock, P. M. After the polls are opened, the candidates announced shall be balloted for; the name of each person voting shall be written on a list at the time of voting, no person being allowed to vote more than once for the same office.


