It will thus be in session seven months out of the twelve.

It seems that all that is necessary to call forth a shot from a Spanish gun is for a vessel flying the stars and stripes to be caught anywhere within a dozen miles of the Cuban coast. Keep Out of Politics.

Death has made some depletions in congress since the election last fall and when the total number of vacancies are summed up it is almost enough to keep a man out of politics, unless he feels that he is prepared to die. The respective instances in which vacancies have occurred are given by an observing political statistician as follows:

Those who have died include Representative Frederick Reman, in the Eighteenth Illinois district, July 16, 1895. Myron B. Wright, (Rep.) of the Fifteenth Pennsylvania district, Nov. 13, 1894. James H. Coddin having been elected to fill the vacancy; Philip S. Post, (Rep.) of the Tenth Illinois district, January 6, 1895, whose place will be filled by George W. Prince; Andrew J. Campbell, (Rep.) of the Tenth New York district, December 5, 1894, and William Cogswell, (Rep.) of the Sixth Massachusetts, May 22. Mr. Campbell was elected in General Daniel Sickles' district in New York and his successor is likely to be a Democrat. In the other two cases there is no change expected in the political bias of the new Representatives. The resignations are J. C. Burrows, (Rep.) of the Third Michigan district, who was chosen to succeed the late Senator Francis B. Stockbridge, and whose successor has been elected in the person of Alfred Milne, and Representative J. C. C. Black, (Dem.) of the Tenth Georgia district, who resigned in consequence of reports that his election had been secured by unfair or improper means. He will go before the people again, so that they may make it clear whether they desire that he or Populist "Tom" Watson shall represent them.

The Cuban Rebellion.

It is difficult to get accurate reports of the many skirmishes and battles fought in Cuba between the Spanish troops and the Cuban revolutionists, but it must be evident to all that the rebellion is stronger today than it has been at any time since the present revolt began, and it is more formidable than any rebellion of the past.

That General Campos, the leader of the Spanish forces, has suffered disastrous defeat in an aggressive campaign against Maceo, the leader of the insurgents, can no longer be disputed, and the success of the revolutionists has certainly been rapidly spreading the revolt amongst the Cuban people during the last few months.

The only possible hope of maintaining Spanish ascendancy in Cuba is in sending an army of not less than 20,000 well equipped troops into Cuba for winter operations, but even then the difficulty would be that the insurgents can elude them in their places of retreat and delay them until another summer comes, when disease would be certain to be much more deadly for the Spanish forces than all the battles they could fight.

Whether Spain is able to meet this great strain upon her is questionable, but unless she can send sufficient forces to overrun the entire country and hold it, Cuban independence may be regarded as in the near future.—Phila. Times.
