To a personal friend William C. Whitney has repeated his determination not to be a candidate for the Presidential nomination on the Democratic ticket. He avers solemnly that he does not want it. Possibly not; but unless Mr. Whitney stops declining what hasn't been offered to him yet people will begin to suspect that he protests too much.

A LONDON dispatch quotes Francis Wilson, the actor, as saying that he had come through the recent hard times in good shape, all owing to the advice of his friend, President Cleveland. The President, according to Wilson, "seemed to be convinced that there would be a terrible depression in business for a year or two," and advised Wilson to cut down his expenses as much as possible and avoid risks. Wilson says he owes his good fortune as a manager to that advice. As the President brought on the depression and gave the country "an object lesson," he was thoroughly competent to give such advice and there is nothing improbable in the story.

It is admitted at the Treasury Department that the Administration relies on the Rothschild syndicate for the protection of the gold reserve. In other words, the richest nation on earth, owing to the incompetency of the party in power, relies on a syndicate of London bankers to protect the financial interests of the Government. Even including the long struggle during the time of the Civil War this country was never before in such humiliating position. And this "protection" secured from foreign bankers has been purchased at the most usurious rate ever paid by the Government for financial aid. The Administration and the party guilty of this great wrong deserve to be spurned by the people.

Sidewalk Ordinance.
SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Burgess and Town Council of the Borough of Tionesta, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That a sidewalk be built on the west side of Elm Street, from the Cemetery gate to the N. E. corner of the Cemetery lot. Said walk to be built of Pine or Hemlock boards, 11 inches thick, 5 feet and 4 inches wide, with three stringers or supports under the walk.
SEC. 2. That a sidewalk be built on the east side of Elm Street, commencing opposite the N. E. corner of the Cemetery lot, and ending at the north line of Mrs. Clyde Smith's lot. Said walk to be built of Pine or Hemlock boards, 11 inches thick, and 4 feet wide, with three stringers or supports under said walk.
SEC. 3. Said walks to be built within sixty days from this date by the owners of land fronting thereon, or it will be built for them at their expense.
