The Allegheny Valley Railway Company will rebuild the three spans of their bridge crossing the Allegheny river at Oil City; commencing the erection of the trestle work of the south span about the latter part of August, placing trestle work under the middle and north spans at periods of about two weeks apart. Falseworks will be in all three spans about October 15th, but in about two weeks thereafter the south span of the bridge will be again reopened for navigation. The customary red lights will be placed on the up-stream side at each pier.

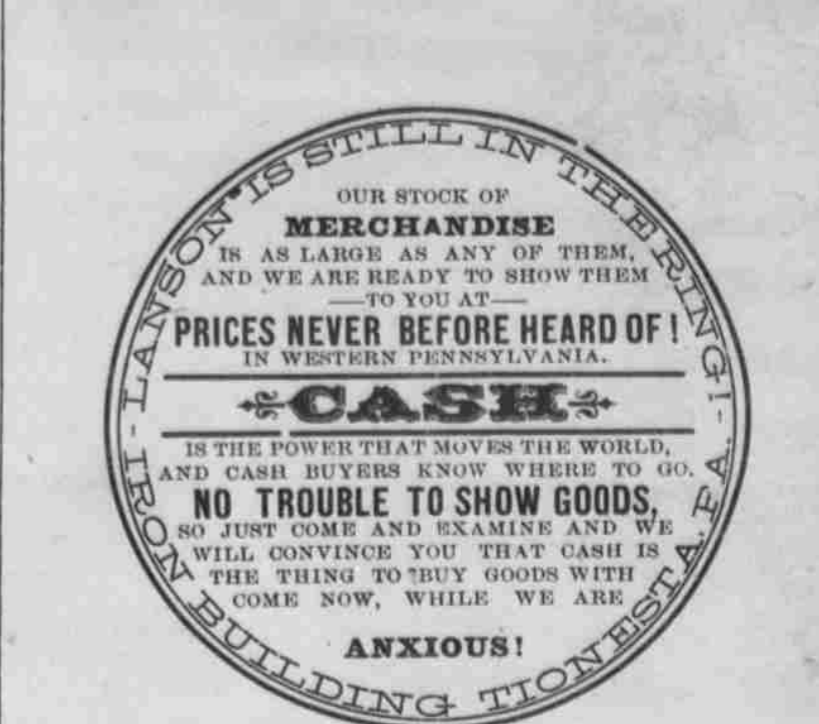
