sylvania: ARTICLE VIII.

SUFFRAGE AND ELECTION. SEC. I. Every male citizen twenty-one years of age, possessing the following qualifications, shall be entitled to vote at all elections: First.—He shall have been a citizen of the United States at least one month, Second.—He shall have resided in the State

one year, (or, if having previously been a qualified elector or native born citizen of the State he shall have removed thereform and returned, then six months,) immedia ely preceding the election.

Third.—He shall have resided in the election district where he offers to vote si

least two months immediately preceding

e ection district where he offers to vote at least two months immediately preceding the election.

Fourth.—If twenty-two years of age or unwards, he shall have paid within two years a State or county tax which shall have been assessed at least two months and paid at least one month before election.

SEC, 2. The General election shall be held annually on the Tuesday next following the first Monday of November, but the General Assembly may, by law, fix a different day, two-thirds of all the members of each House consenting thereto.

Notice is hereby given, That any person excepting Justices of the Peace, who shall held any office or appointment of profit or trust under the United States, or this State, or any city or corporated district, whether commissioned officer or agent who is or shall be employed under the legislature, executive or judiciary department of this State, or in any city, or of any incorporated district, and also that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature, or of the select or common council of any city, or or of any inby of Congress and of the State Legisla ture, or of the select or common council of any city, or commissioners of any in-corporated district, is by law incapable of holding or exercising at the time, the office or appointment of judge, inspector or clerk of any election in this Common-wealth, and that no inspector, indge or other officer of such election shall be eligi-
