Mr. Arnold's Pension Bill.

Congressman Arnold, of this district, has introduced in the House a bill providing for the transfer of the names of a certain class of pensioners from one set to another set of rolls in the Pension Department.

By the terms of this bill all soldiers and sailors now on the rolls of the Pension Department of the United States under the provisions of the act of June 27, 1890, or who may hereafter be placed on such rolls under the provisions of this act, and who have filed a claim for pension under any previous law...

The details of carrying out the provisions of this act, involving the transfer of the claimant's name from one set of pension rolls to another in the Pension Department, the relinquishment of one pension certificate, and the substitution of another therefor, and other matters in this connection, shall be governed by such rules and regulations as the Secretary of the Interior may provide.

Mr. Arnold feels confident of the passage of this bill.

The Monroe Doctrine.

Senator Davis' resolution reaffirming the Monroe Doctrine was reported from the Committee on Foreign Relations on Monday of last week.

Resolved, That the United States of America reaffirms and confirms the doctrine and principles promulgated by President Monroe in his message of December 2, 1823, and declares that it will assert and maintain the doctrine and those principles, and will regard any infringement thereof, and particularly any attempt by any European power to take or acquire any new or additional territory on the American continent...
