CAPTAIN CLARK, of the State Bureau of industrial statistics connected with the department of internal affairs, is compiling some important facts regarding the tin plate industry of Pennsylvania. The importance and extent of this in this Commonwealth alone are not generally realized. It seems there are thirty-three tin plate establishments in this state; but all of them are not manufacturers of the "black plate." As to these plants, it is a remarkable fact regarding their location and distribution that they are just about equally distributed over the eastern and western portions of the state, eighteen being found west of the Alleghenies and fifteen east of them. The forthcoming pamphlet on tin plate will be in the nature of a revelation in this line to the general public, and will be one of the most important contributions to tin plate literature yet made.

A COMMODITY more objectionable and quite as fraudulent as oleomargarine is "filled cheese" made of lard and skim milk and sold as the regular dairy product. A bill has been introduced into the House of Representatives to tax this counterfeit cheese with the view apparently to make its manufacture and sale unprofitable. The Record objects to getting rid of a fraud by taxation, but the main thing is to get it suppressed, and that accomplished it is of small account whether it was eradicated by a tax or a hatchet. A tax is a necessary evil when imposed on legitimate business or property, but when it operates to expose and suppress a fraud it becomes an essential good. People should not be given lard and skim milk for cheese, and if those who attempt this fraud can be more certainly reached and fined by the Quarter Sessions Court a law heavily taxing their product is the best way to reach them.—Phila. Press.
