Among the Forest County Gold Hunters.

Wm, Lawrence who recently started on a visit to the gold hunters from Forest ounty, now located near Ward, Colorado, writes a letter home to a friend rom which we cull the following:

I arrived at Ward on Sunday evening. Found Dick Davis stopping at Boulder, 19 miles from Ward. Sunday was a fine day and so Dick came up with me. Found Sam. Clark in the "shaft house;" also Mr. Huliugs. No Sunday in this country. It's gold the boys are after. After a short visit here, Dick and I started for Davey Hiland's gold mine,

one and a half miles from Hulings'. Dick stood the trip well. We took Davey by surprise, and found him the only one in all the country round that was making any show at keeping the Sabbath.

He was reading-a dime novel! his only companion a faithful dog. Of course the boys were all glad to see me.

I spent Saturday in Denver. The weather was fine, showing the grandeur of the city to good advantage. I will not andertake a description of this country now; suffice it to say, it appears to me like one hill piled on top of another. We intended going to the highest peak to-day, but it snowed hard all day Monday, and this, Wednesday, morning, it is not safe the measure. Should this appropriation to stick one's nose out of doors, and the boys tell me this is just a gentle breeze. Davey struck a fine pay streak of gold

and silver, the latter predominating a little. A sample tested showed that it runs \$11.82 to the ton. I helped him put in a blast Tusday and it is showing up better. I may stake off two or three before leaving. Sam has a good thing here as general superintendent of the Hulings mines. Miners get \$3.00 per day, 10 men in a shaft. They burn seven

cords of wood a day at a cost of \$3.00 a cord. So you see it is quite expensive compelled to make the announcement of to run a shaft mine. Davey's is a tunnel while his cigar and tobacco stock is the death of this excellent man and mine and is not so expensive. This country is covered with pine as far as you can see.
