That he would give the country a thorough business administration even his enemies will admit, while his platform of purer government for city, state and national affairs is one which every honest voter can cheerfully endorse.

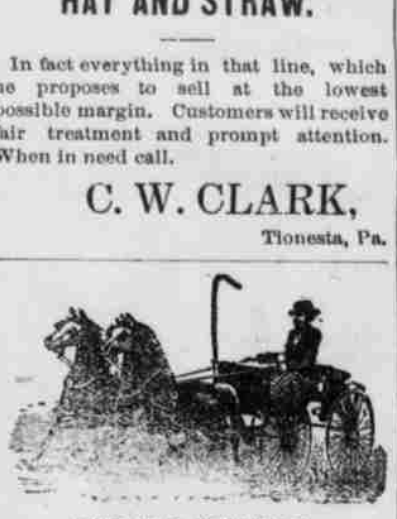
