Forest County Agricultural Society. At the close of the Tuesday afternoon session of the farmers' institute last week a permanent organization was effected by the election of the following officers:

President, C. A. Randall, Tionesta. Vice Presidents—E. A. Kuhns, Barnett; Amos E. Ledebur, Green; Geo. L. King, Harmony; Samuel Mervin, Hickory; J. A. Nash, Howe; Cyrus F. Hunt, Jenks; R. C. Heath, Kingsley; Robert Mealy Tionesta twp.

Secretary, J. Albaugh, Hickory. The new organization was by unanimous consent named the Forest County Agricultural Society. According to resolution the first meeting of the officers and members will take place Tuesday evening, May 23, 1896. At the close of the Institute on Tuesday evening Mr. Ledebur, of the committee on resolutions, read and the Institute unanimously adopted the following

resolutions: Resolved, That we the farmers of Forest Co. and those interested in the success of this great and useful work of cultivating the soil, and that connected therewith, in convention assembled, at Tionesta, recognize the benefits and advantages that are derived from the State College, in disseminating useful knowledge of agriculture and scientific farming, and that we thank our Legislature for establishing the Department of Agriculture, believing it will be a lasting benefit to this important industry; we therefore urge all citizens of the state to aid the department in every possible way.

That we favor the establishment of township High Schools, and that science of agriculture should be one of the branches taught, and that laws should be passed giving to our country girls and boys the same advantages for scientific education as our town children have.

That our roads should be built on scientific principles, that obstructions be removed so that all persons using the roads may do so with safety to themselves in all roads used for travel.

That we recommend each farmer to secure as good a library as his means will permit, place in the latest works and magazines, and we especially recommend the reading of the Chautauqua Course of Agriculture.

That we return our grateful thanks to Col. Woodward, Dr. Rothrock, Thos. J. Lodge, Dr. Armsby and Prof. Hamilton for the useful instructions given us in the several subjects relating to agriculture and road making.

That we thank the County Commissioners for the use of the Court House, and that we thank those who took part in the music and enlivened the exercises with song.

That our thanks are tendered Hon. C. A. Randall, Chairman, for his efficient work in organizing this institute and managing it.

That we also thank all those who took part in the exercises and assisted in the work.

Tionesta township, at Township House. Tionesta Borough, at Court House. At which time and places they will by their votes nominate:— One person for Congress. One person for Assembly. One person for Prothonotary. One person for Sheriff. Two persons for County Commissioners.

Two persons for County Auditors. One person for Jury Commissioner. One person for Delegate to the National Convention. One person for Delegate to the State Convention. Each election precinct will also elect one person for member of the County Committee for the ensuing year. The polls will remain open until 7 p. m. Return Judges will convene at the Court House, Tionesta Borough, on the following Tuesday, April 7, at 2 o'clock, p. m.

Attention is called to the Act of June, 1881, regulating Primary Elections, that Judges and Clerks, before entering upon the discharge of their duties shall take and subscribe an oath or affirmation in presence of each other.

Proper election blanks and tickets will be mailed to the committeemen of the different precincts in due time. It is their duty to see that these are promptly on hand on the day of the primaries.

REPUBLICAN PRIMARY RULES.

RULES GOVERNING THE REPUBLICAN PRIMARY ELECTIONS OF FOREST COUNTY.

1. The candidates for the several offices shall have their names printed in one or more of the county papers at least three weeks previous to the Primary Meetings stating the office and subject to the action of the party at the said primary meetings.

2. The voters belonging to the Republican party in each township and borough shall meet on a day to be designated by the County Committee, at the usual place of holding spring elections, at 2 o'clock, P. M., and proceed to elect one person for Judge, and two persons for Clerks, who shall form a Board of Elections to receive votes and determine who are the proper persons to vote and who shall hold the polls open until 7 o'clock, P. M. After the polls are opened, the candidates announced shall be balloted for; the name of each person voting shall be written on a list at the time of voting, no person being allowed to vote more than once for the same office.

3. After the polls are closed the board shall proceed to count the votes that each candidate has received, and make out the returns accordingly to be certified by the Judge and attested by the Clerks.

4. The Judge (or one of the clerks appointed by the board) of the respective election district, shall meet at the Court House, in Tionesta, on the Tuesday following the Primary Meetings at 2 o'clock P. M. having the returns and a list of voters, and the person having the highest number of votes for any office, shall be declared the nominee of the Republican party.

5. The Return Judges shall be competent to reject by a majority, the returns from any district where there is evidence of fraud, either in the returns or otherwise, and shall report where there is evidence of three or more persons voting at the Primary Meeting who are not Republicans.

6. Any two or more persons having an equal number of votes for the same office the Judges shall proceed to ballot for a choice, the person having the highest number to be the nominee.

7. The Return Judges, shall appoint Conferees—Representative, Senatorial and Congressional—whose acceptance of said appointments shall be a pledge to support the person who may receive the largest number of votes cast for that office.

8. The Return Judges may at any time change the mode and manner of selecting candidates as they may be instructed by the people at their primary meetings, due notice being given by the County Committee.

9. The Chairman of the County Committee shall be required to issue a call in pursuance of the action of the County Committee.
