It is difficult to understand why Senator Hill should be so strongly opposed to an investigation on the bond transaction of the Democratic administration. When Uncle Sam is bamboozled out of ten or twelve millions of dollars there is certainly no good reason why an effort should not be made to ascertain how the hold-up was accomplished.—Blizzard.

Mr. Depew will have a chance to say something memorial when he undertakes, on May 7, to send a message around the world with electricity generated by Niagara Falls. The sentence of eight words will be sent by way of England, Portugal and India, to Australia, returning to the room in which Mr. Depew is seated via Cape Town, Portugal and Brazil. It is thought that the round trip of the epigram will occupy only a few minutes.

During 1895 we imported 20,748, 108 pounds of shoddy, more than during any other year, while in 1892, a year during which the Republican tariff was in full operation, we imported less than 300,000 pounds. Then the American people bought and were able to pay for good honest cloth, woven from American wool and spun in American mills. Now they are wearing foreign shoddy and are compelled to buy it on credit.—Burlington Hawk-Eye.

One thing that helps to deplete the gold in the Treasury is this: Under the new tariff American merchants are buying some goods abroad that they formerly bought here. It takes gold to pay for them. But the gold shipment is not all; these goods take the place of the products of American labor. Under this plan the Europeans get more work to do and the Americans less. No financial system ever devised can help the man who is out of money and out of a job.—Texas Tribune.

That arch fiend, H. H. Holmes, "shuffled off" at the end of a rope in Moyamensing prison, Philadelphia, at 10:12 a. m. last Thursday. He declared his innocence of all murders with which he was charged, but admitted his responsibility for the death of two women, who died at his hands "as the result of criminal operations." The public takes more stock in his first confession, in which he tells about murdering 27 persons, and there will be a general feeling of relief that we are at least done with the greatest, because the most remorseless, criminal of the age.

Since the year opened 16,000 Italian immigrants have arrived in this country, and 15,000 are waiting for transportation at the Italian seaports. Of the thousands of this nationality who reached New York last week several hundred were returned because they were without the few dollars required to prove that they would not at once become a public charge. There is something wrong at the Italian ports when the steamships accept the last dollar of immigrants, knowing that they will be sent back if the laws of this country are executed. It is hard to say what a consular service is good for unless it can impress immigrants with the fact that they cannot land in America without complying with the regulations.

Under the Harrison Administration the revenues of the Government, brought in under the operation of the McKinley law, were not only more than sufficient to meet the current expenditures of the Government, but, under the wise administration of the Republican party, the excess was applied to the payment of the national debt, and more than \$260,000,000 of the national debt was paid off. Not only that, but the Republican party turned the Treasury over with \$107,000,000 in gold and nearly \$40,000,000 of other money to the incoming Democratic Administration. What has been done by the Democratic party or the Democratic Administration since it came into power? Instead of paying off any part of our national debt, they have increased our national debt to the enormous sum of \$262,315,000 in a period of a little over three years' time. This imposes upon the people of this country an indebtedness in interest alone of \$11,492,816 over and above the other expenditures that we had under a Republican Administration. This expense comes year after year, and these \$262,000,000 are a mortgage upon the people of this country extending over a period of thirty years.

J. Flynn, Kingsley Twp.; Jury Commissioner, Geo. D. Shields, Barnett Twp. The only offices for which there was any opposition was County Commissioner and Jury Commissioner. For the former the vote stood as follows:
