In his capacity as chairman of the Republican State central committee, United States Senator Quay has appointed the executive committee and the members-at-large of that body.

Ex-State Treasurer Henry K. Boyer is chairman of the executive committee, and his associates are Congressman William A. Stone, of Allegheny; Congressman John B. Robinson, of Media; Lieutenant Governor Walter Lyon, of Pittsburg; Ex-Lieutenant Governor Louis A. Watres, of Scranton; Ex-Collector Thomas V. Cooper, of Media; Senator William H. Andrews, of Titusville; Senator Boies Penrose, of Philadelphia; Senator C. Wesley Thomas, of Philadelphia; Lyman D. Gilbert, of Harrisburg; James B. Holland, of Norristown, and W. W. Griest, of Lancaster.

The State committee-at-large are John Russell Young, Charles H. Heustis and Alexander Crow, Jr., of Philadelphia; William B. Gill, of Cheltenham; Parker L. Walker, of Pittsburg; Congressman W. C. Arnold, of DuBois; A. C. Hopkins, of Lock Haven; Senator W. U. Brewer, of Chambersburg; Representative Walter T. Merriek, of Blossburg; Floyd T. Kinner, of Athens; James B. Raymond, of Altoona, and William Connell, of Scranton, the last named filling the vacancy occasioned by the transfer of Mr. Griest to the executive committee.

All the gentlemen named have consented to serve, and Executive Chairman Boyer will take charge of the State committee headquarters at 1231 Walnut street without delay. Jere B. Rex, of Huntingdon, and W. R. Andrews, of Meadville, the secretaries of the State committee, are already on duty at the headquarters, getting the preliminaries in shape for the opening of the campaign.

CHARLESTON, S. C., has now 108 manufacturing industries, employing 5507 people, and turning out annually over \$14,000,000 in products. The growth of Republican sentiment in that State has been rapid of late and is likely to be substantial.
