The Republican National Convention.

The eleventh National Convention of the Republican party was convened in St. Louis yesterday. C. W. Fairbanks of Indiana was chosen temporary chairman, and after the organization of the great convention Senator John M. Thurston will preside as permanent chairman over its deliberations. It is not believed that the convention will finish its work before Friday, and may last till the beginning of next week, though that is hardly probable. The nomination of Major McKinley will be made on first ballot and possibly by acclamation. As to who will be placed on the ticket as his running mate is a question yet somewhat mixed. There is talk of Hobart of New Jersey, Morton, Depew and Fassett of New York, Dingley, Frye and Cleaves of Maine, Hastings of Pennsylvania, Evans of Tennessee, and others. But the Vice Presidency is not as difficult a question to settle as the financial plank. With this knotty problem out of the way the sailing would be easy and the work of the convention could be very quickly disposed of.

There is almost an entire absence of bad blood among the contending factions, and especially so with the prominent candidates themselves, and whatever the outcome it will be satisfactory to the great mass of the party throughout the nation and the ticket will be a sure winner in the fall.

CONGRESS has wound up business and adjourned. It was one of the shortest sessions ever held in a long session year.

SECRETARY CARLISLE denies the report that he has become wealthy while holding his present office. The President appears to be the only member of the administration who has made a fortune.

SO LONG as the domain of America extends from the shores of the Atlantic to the shores of the Pacific, from the icy waters of the Lakes to the tepid waters of the Gulf, our tariff policy, to be truly American, must be truly protective.

THE President has signed the bill providing that a year's residence in any of the territories shall be necessary before application can be made to the territorial courts for a divorce. A large assortment of legal and judicial absters will have to join the lottery people in looking for another job.

ANOTHER issue of bonds in the near future by the government is the fruit of the acts of President Cleveland, Secretary Carlisle and the solid Democratic vote in the United States Senate, defeating the revenue bill passed by the Republican House early in the session, which would have added 40,000,000 annually to the receipts of the Treasury and thereby avoided the necessity for issuing bonds. - Citizen-Press.

The McKinley Idea.

It has been held against Mr. McKinley that he is a man with but one idea - the idea of Protection. What if he is? What is the McKinley "idea"? It is an American "idea" throughout. Mr. McKinley has not one public thought or sentiment ever in his mind that is not imbued with Americanism. And we have had too little Americanism of late, far too little. The one issue before the people to-day in the issue of Protection to all American interests. Our mines, our forests, our fisheries, our manufacturers and our agriculture, all need a strong touch of the American "idea." The people are demanding a restoration of the American "idea" of 1890, and who so able to give it to them as Mr. McKinley? With the Tariff issue to be met, with reciprocity to be re-established, with the problem of Oriental competition confronting us, to what other leader can the people naturally turn rather than to McKinley? It is his idea they want.

There is no man in the United States to-day who is more bitterly hated in England than McKinley. That fact alone is proof that he is the best man for President of the United States. Why are the Democratic papers so opposed to his receiving the Republican nomination? Simply because they know that he is a thorough American, and the history of the present Democratic administration in its every line shows un-Americanism. The people have had too much of this, therefore they have risen with one voice to demand a restoration of the American "idea," and, with it, they demand the man who represents that "idea" - William McKinley - for President of the United States. - Economist.

Lost His Leg and Died from the Effects of His Injuries.

Conductor John Carroll, of the W. N. Y. & P., had his leg so severely crushed beneath the wheels of an engine at Thompson's last Friday that the limb had to be amputated a few inches above the knee. Mr. Carroll has been engaged in the railroad business for the past 20 years and this was his first accident. For ten years he has been employed by the W. N. Y. & P. as freight and extra passenger conductor, and had charge of the way freight when the accident occurred. He pulled into the siding about noon to allow another train to pass and had ordered the crew to cut one of the cars from the rear of the engine. He stepped on the pilot of the moving engine and leaned over to see if the work was being done correctly when he slipped and his right leg was caught beneath the wheels of the forward truck. One wheel passed over the leg near the ankle and the other crossed near the knee, mangleing the leg almost to a jelly from the knee down. He was taken to Tidoute where Dr. McGill amputated the leg about ten inches below the groin, and the injured man was sent to Oil City by a special train. He arrived here at 7 o'clock and taken to the hospital where he was turned over to the care of Drs. Ritchey and Couler. They found Mr. Carroll's system had been seriously affected by the shock, and this, with his advanced age, about 45 years, makes his condition serious. Conductor Carroll is one of the most popular as well as one of the oldest employees of the road, and has a wife and family at Siverly. - Derrick.

LATER - The unfortunate man died from the effects of his injuries at the Oil City hospital on Saturday last, at 3:30 p. m. It is thought he sustained some internal injuries. He leaves a wife and seven children.
