MCRINLEY AND HOBART.

These are the Republican Standard Bearers for the Fall Election.

The great Republican convention at St. Louis last week did its work promptly and well, having fully met the expectations of the people of the nation both in the selection of its candidates and the adoption of principles on which the battle is to be The gallant Major McKinley was nominated for President on first ballot by the following vote:

61½; Morton, 58; Allison, 35½. The
nomination was promptly made unanimous by a rising vote. Immediately after the demonstration incident to ly after the demonstration incident to McKinley's nomination, (it lasted 20 minutes), had subsided, the nomination of a candidate for Vice President was proceeded with the first ballot resulting : Garrett A. Hobart of New Jersey, 5334, which included the solid vote of Pennsylvania, 64; Evans of Tennessee 2771; Bulkeley of Connecticut 39; Walker of Virginia 24; Reed 3, with scattering votes for Thurston, Fred. Grant, Depew and Morton.

The Platform.
