These are the Republican Standard Banners for the Fall Election.

The great Republican convention at St. Louis last week did its work promptly and well, having fully met the expectations of the people of the nation both in the selection of its candidates and the adoption of principles on which the battle is to be fought.

Upon the adoption of the platform, and before the balloting for candidates began, the delegates from Colorado and Idaho, 4 from Montana and 3 from Nevada, about 20 in all, left the hall, whereupon Chairman Thurston curtly remarked that there seemed to be enough delegates left to do business and the work of the convention would proceed.

Senator Quay was elected Pennsylvania's member of the National Committee, and Marcus A. Hanna, the manager of Major McKinley's campaign, was chosen Chairman of the Committee.

The Platform. "The Republicans of the United States, assembled by their representatives in National Convention, appealing for the popular and historical justification of their claims to the better fruits of four years of Democratic control, as well as the matchless improvements of thirty years of Republican rule, earnestly and confidently assert that the balance of the awakened intelligence, experience and conscience of their countrymen in the following declaration of facts and principles:

"For the first time since the civil war the American people have now witnessed the calamitous consequences of full and unrestricted Democratic control of the government. It has been a record of unparalleled incapacity, dishonesty and disaster.

"In the administrative management it has ruthlessly sacrificed indispensable revenue, asked ordinary current running expenses with borrowed money, piled up the public debt \$252,990,000 in time of peace, and allowed the balance of trade, kept a perpetual menace hanging over the redemption fund for pawned American credit to alien syndicates and reversed all the measures and results of successful Republican rule.

"In the broad effect of its policy it has precipitated panic, lighted industry and trade with prolonged depression, closed factories, reduced work and wages, halted enterprises and crippled American production, while stimulating foreign production in the American market.

"Every consideration of public safety and individual interest demands that the government shall be rescued from the hands of those who have shown themselves incapable of conducting it without disaster at home and dishonor abroad and shall be restored to the party which for thirty years administered it with unequalled success and prosperity.

"We renew and emphasize our allegiance to the policy of protection as the bulwark of American industrial independence and the foundation of American development and prosperity. This true American policy taxes foreign products and encourages home industry; it puts the burden of revenue on foreign goods; it secures the American market for the American producers; it upholds the American standard of wages for the American workman; it puts the factory by the side of the farm and makes the American farmer less dependent on foreign demand and protection than the general thrift and finds the strength of all on the strength of each. In its responsible application it is just, fair and impartial, equally opposed to foreign control and domestic monopoly, to sectional discrimination and individual favoritism.

Interest which gain open markets for us in return for our open markets to others. Protection builds up domestic industry and trade and secures our own market for ourselves; reciprocity builds up foreign trade and finds an outlet for our surplus.

"We favor restoring the early American policy of discriminating duties for the upbuilding of our merchant marine and the protection of our shipping in the foreign carrying trade, so that American ships—the product of American labor employed in American shipyards, sailing under the stars and stripes and manned, officered and owned by Americans—may regain the carrying of our foreign commerce.

"The platform is too lengthy for our columns at one time, and we will publish the remainder next week.
