The new American flag, with forty-five stars goes into use in the United States Navy on July 4.

The Cuban insurgents can hold out until March 4, 1897, they will be sure of receiving substantial aid and comfort from the United States.

Both McKinley and Hobart, like Garfield, taught school in their early days. Lincoln saw little of school houses, but he trained one star pupil, himself, under countless disadvantages.

The election of Mr. Hanna as Chairman of the Republican National Committee means that the bungling in the management of the last campaign will not be repeated in the present one.

The free silver seceders insist that they are not influenced by local considerations, but the fact remains that they all happen to live in states where silver mining is a leading industry.

Another Ohio man at the front. William H. Harrison in 1840, U. S. Grant in 1868, R. B. Hayes 1876, James A. Garfield in 1880, Benjamin Harrison in 1888, and William McKinley in 1896. Although Grant and the later Harrison hailed from other states when nominated, both were natives of Ohio.

The exports of sugar from Cuba during the current crop year, now nearly at an end, will be only about one-fifth of the usual amount. After this stock is exhausted, the prices are likely to advance, which means that the people of the United States will have to pay more for an article of common use, or get along with less of it. And yet the Cleveland administration holds that we have not sufficient interest in the Cuban war to justify intervention on our part.

Republican National Platform.

Following are the concluding planks in the platform adopted by the Republican National Convention, the first portion of which we gave last week:

SUGAR.

We condemn the present administration for not keeping faith with the sugar producers of this country. The Republican party favors such protection as will lead to the production on American soil of all the sugar which the American people use, and for which they pay the countries more than \$100,000,000 annually.

WOOL AND WOOLLENS.

To all our products—to those of the mine and the field as well as to those of the shop and the factory—to hemp, to wool, the product of the great industry, as well as to the finished woolsens of the mill—we promise the most ample protection.

PENSIONERS.

The veterans of the Union army deserve and should receive fair treatment and generous recognition. When ever practicable they should be given the preference in the matter of employment, and they are entitled to the enactment of such laws as are best calculated to secure the fulfillment of the pledges made to them in the dark days of the country's peril. We denounce the practice in the pension bureau, so recklessly and unjustly carried on by the present administration, of reducing pensions and arbitrarily dropping names from the rolls as deserving the severest condemnation of the American people.

FOREIGN RELATIONS.

Our foreign policy should be at all times firm, vigorous and dignified, and all our interests in the western hemisphere carefully watched and guarded. The Hawaiian islands should be controlled by the United States, and no foreign power should be permitted to interfere with them; the Nicaraguan canal should be built, owned and operated by the United States; and by the purchase of the Danish islands we should secure a proper and much needed naval station in the West Indies.

The massacres in Armenia have aroused the deep sympathy and indignation of the American people and we believe that the United States should exercise its right to bring these atrocities to an end. In Turkey, American residents have been exposed to the gravest dangers and American property destroyed. There and everywhere American citizens and the American property must be absolutely protected at all hazards and at any cost.

MONROE DOCTRINE.

We reassert the Monroe doctrine in its full extent, and we reaffirm the right of the United States to give the doctrine effect by responding to the appeals of any American state for friendly intervention in case of European encroachment. We have not interfered and shall not interfere with the existing possessions of any European power in this hemisphere, but those possessions must not, on any pretext be extended. We hope to look forward to the eventual withdrawal of the European powers from this hemisphere, and to the ultimate union of all English speaking parts of the continent by the free consent of its inhabitants.

CUBA.

From the hour of achieving their own independence the people of the United States have regarded with sympathy the struggles of other American people to free themselves from European domination. We watch with deep and abiding interest the heroic battle of the Cuban patriots against cruelty and oppression, and our best hopes go out for the full success to that determined contest for liberty.

The government of Spain, having lost control of Cuba, and being unable to protect the property or lives of resident American citizens, or to comply with its treaty obligations, we believe that the

government of the United States should actually use its influence and good offices to restore peace and give independence to the island.

THE NAVY.

The peace and security of the Republic and the maintenance of its rightful influence among the nations of the earth demand a naval power commensurate with its position and responsibility. We, therefore, favor the continued enlargement of the navy and a complete system of harbor and seacoast defenses.

FOREIGN IMMIGRATION.

For the protection of the quality of our American citizenship and of the wages of our workmen against the fatal competition of low-priced labor, we demand that the immigration laws be thoroughly enforced and so extended as to exclude from entrance to the United States those who can neither read nor write.

The civil service law was placed on the statute books by the Republican party, which has always sustained it, and we renew our repeated declarations that it shall be thoroughly and honestly enforced and extended wherever practicable.

We demand that every citizen of the United States shall be allowed to cast one free and unrestricted ballot, and that such ballot shall be counted and returned as cast.

We proclaim our unqualified condemnation of the uncivilized and barbarous practice, well known as lynching or killing human beings, suspected or charged with crime, without process of law.

We favor the creation of a national board of arbitration to settle and adjust differences which may arise between employers and employees engaged in interstate commerce.

We believe in the immediate return to the free homestead policy of the Republican party, and urge the passage by Congress of the satisfactory free homestead measure, which has already passed the house and is now pending in the senate.

We favor the admission of the remaining territories at the earliest practicable date, having due regard to the interests of the people of the territories and of the United States. All the federal officers appointed for the territories should be elected from bona fide residents thereof, and the right of self government should be accorded as far as practicable.

We believe the citizens of Alaska should have representation in the Congress of the United States, to the end that needed legislation may be intelligently enacted.

We sympathize with all wise and legitimate efforts to lessen and prevent the evils of intemperance and promote morality.

The Republican party is mindful of the rights and interests of women. Protection of American industries includes equal opportunities, equal pay for equal work, and protection to the home. We favor the admission of women to wider spheres of usefulness, and we deem their co-operation necessary in resending the country from Democratic and Populist mismanagement and misrule.

Such are the principles and policies of the Republican party. By these principles we will abide and these policies we will put into execution. We ask for the consideration and judgment of the American people. Confident alike in the history of our great party and in the justice of our cause, we present our platform and our candidates in the full assurance that the election will bring victory to the Republican party and prosperity to the United States.
