Russell stripped his own clothing from his body, even to his shirt, wrapped the sufferer up and took him to his house at Plumer, and then sent to Rouseville for Dr. Tyler, who dressed the burns, and had Shaw taken to the hospital. The patient was too far gone for medical aid to accomplish more than to relieve his intense agonies, and he died at an early hour yesterday morning, and his body was sent home for burial."
