MARIENVILLE'S BIG DAY.

The Town Royally Entertains a Large Crowd of Veterans and Civilians.

Marienville again demonstrated her large-hearted hospitality and ability to entertain a large crowd on the occasion of the first annual reunion of the Forest County Soldiers' Association, on Thursday last, 10th inst. The town was handsomely and profusely decorated with the national colors, waving a welcome to all. Veterans and friends began to arrive early in the morning and by noon it is estimated there were 1500 strangers in the town. At 12 o'clock the veterans and their families assembled at headquarters, where the ladies had spread a most sumptuous banquet that was enjoyed by nearly or quite 400.

At 3 o'clock the parade formed in line for the march to the grove in the following order: Stow Post of Tionesta, Herlin Post of East Hickory, Wray Post of Marienville, Jenks Lodge I. O. O. F., Forest Tent K. O. T. M., Forest Hive L. O. T. M., Washington Camp P. O. S. of A., E. A. U., School Children and citizens.

Comrade Witherell's martial band headed the procession, and Cooksburg's fine brass band came in about the center of the line, which extended nearly the entire length of the town. Marienville's more than four hundred school pupils adding wonderful interest to the handsome pageant. At the grove, where Comrades C. H. Wilton and James L. Woods ably officiated, seats had been arranged and large stage room for the choir, speakers and officers. The exercises were begun with appropriate selections by the L. O. T. M. choir of Marienville, and the Redeflyfo choir. These two organizations were repeatedly called upon for music, and their renditions were certainly very fine and received many flattering compliments.

Dr. S. S. Towler was the first speaker called upon, and in his usually eloquent style made a most cordial welcome to the old soldiers and their friends. His speech was full of good cheer for the veterans and pleasant humor for the audience generally. Comrade Albaugh was next in order, and after paying glowing tribute to the memory of the late Col. Gaul, he gave his hearers a twenty-minute oration that was listened to with marked attention and interest, and was frequently interrupted with approving applause. S. D. Irwin Esq., was the last speaker, and for nearly half an hour kept the large audience in a happy mood by his quaint sayings and inimitable style, paying a glowing tribute to the hospitalities of Marienville's people. After some beautiful music by the choir, Rev. A. S. Stewart pronounced the benediction and the pleasant meeting at the grove was over, the soldiers being again invited to repair to headquarters where a bountiful supper awaited them.

To say that the first reunion of the veterans was a splendid success is but to voice the sentiment of all who were fortunate enough to be present. The day was an ideal one, the arrangements for the entertainment of their guests by the citizens were ample and perfect, and not an accident occurred to mar the proceedings. The crowd was large, yet there was not so much as a ripple of excitement or disorder of any kind, the people seeming to move about in a quiet way, enjoying what the set out to have - a real reunion. Marienville is certainly to be congratulated on her hospitality and ability to entertain.

MINUTES OF MEETING OF THE VETERAN SOLDIERS' ASSOCIATION OF FOREST COUNTY, PA. Association assembled, Pres't Daniel S. Knox in the chair, Roll of officers called, present, J. W. Morrow, Treas.; Samuel D. Irwin, Sec'y. The house was then called to order by the President, who stated briefly but clearly the object of the meeting. The minutes of the last meeting were then read and approved.

Roll of the association was then called after which nomination of officers was declared in order. The following named officers were then elected to serve for the ensuing year, viz: President, Charles H. Wilton, of Marienville; Ist V. Pres't, Jonathan Albaugh, of East Hickory; 2nd V. Pres't, F. X. Kreidler, of Nebraska; Secretary, Samuel D. Irwin, of Tionesta; Treasurer, J. W. Morrow, of Tionesta.

Moved by Jonathan Albaugh that the association select the place for holding the next annual reunion, adopted. Whereupon Tionesta and East Hickory were named. A vote being taken resulted as follows: For Tionesta 30 votes, for East Hickory 35 votes. So East Hickory was declared the place.

It was then resolved that the date for holding the next reunion be left with the executive committee to arrange in due time. Suggested that cards be sent members of the next reunion in proper time. The following persons were made honorary members of the association, or "adopted" as such: Dr. S. S. Towler, Jas. Morrison and James Powers, of Marienville; E. E. Clapp, of President; and Jas. H. Pones, of Tionesta. On motion, resolved, that the sons of soldiers of the late war, above the age of 15 years, who wish to join this association, may do so, and are declared eligible to membership on same terms as veterans.

Wilton, his successor, with appropriate remarks, and President Wilton neatly thanked the association for the honor conferred upon him, after which, at the instigation of the new President, the members formed in line for the banquet.
