A few words in relation to the Republican County Ticket at this time will not be amiss. Our candidate for Congress,

HON. WILLIAM C. ARNOLD, has made a record in the National House that is at once a great credit to himself and the constituency which he represents. FRANK P. WALKER, of Green township, the nominee of the Republicans of Forest county for Sheriff, is another who deserves the united and earnest support of the people for the office to which he aspires. From boyhood Frank has been a hard worker, having for upward of 25 years been employed in the lumber woods of Forest county. Mr. HARRISON's speech in New York was one of the best presentations of the political issues made by any speaker during the canvass. HON. W. C. ARNOLD has been attending some meetings this week in Forest and Elk counties. His addresses have been listened to by thousands and they have not been wasted upon desert air, as the most casual observer would not fail to notice. He has been talking in a district where the average intelligence of the voters is high; he has been talking to the people who read the daily press and note the current of events, and they are consequently eager to hear the issues treated by good speakers, especially the one who will probably represent them in the next Congress. THE Populist Executive Committee rebukes candidate Watson and other middle-of-the-road men who are not satisfied with the committee's fusion arrangements. If Mr. Watson is really a candidate for Vice President of the United States he has every reason to be dissatisfied with a fusion which insures his defeat. Were the Democratic ticket successful there would be no chance for Watson, for he has not enough electors running to make him Vice President, even if they were all elected. We do not wonder Mr. Watson kicks and that his committee finds it necessary to read him a lecture for misbehaving in public.

It is taxing the ingenuity of the Bryanites to the utmost to get around Archbishop Ireland's letter indorsing McKinley and showing the evil influence that a cheap dollar would have upon the workingman. The Archbishop is admittedly one of the ablest prelates in the country. The man does not live who, knowing him personally, would say he had been bought. Besides, the argument he makes is unanswerable.

It should not be necessary to urge Republicans to attend the election this year and devote the day to the cause of the party. The straight ticket should be their watchword. Put the cross mark in the circle at the head of the first column of the ticket. Let every loyal Republican bear in mind that this is one of the most important years in the history of the country, and let him do his duty accordingly.

It has been the aim of the Republican party this year to place on their ticket as candidates for county and state officers the names of men who are above reproach. Men who are self-made and have the interest and welfare of the people at heart. In W. C. Arnold, our present representative in Congress and candidate for re-election, we have one who by his manly and dignified course in the lower house has met with general approval from Democrats and Republicans alike. He is constant in the discharge of his duty. Every interest of this congressional district is watched over carefully by him. ONE of the indications of the trend of political sentiment in Chicago is a poll of the tenants of Governor Altgeld's Unity Building in that city, which has been made prominent in the campaign because all rents in it are made payable in "standard gold coin of the United States" although its owner favors free silver. There are 425 men of voting age in the building and of the 402 who expressed a preference 273 are for McKinley, 87 for Bryan and 24 for Palmer. The canvass was made by one of the tenants, every outsider who attempted it having been excluded from the premises. It was evidently Governor Altgeld's aim to keep the political preferences of his tenants as secret as the terms of his leases. But the discovered situation is as striking an evidence of the drift of opinion in Chicago as anything which has come to light.
