As there was only a single tank ready to receive the oil it was soon filled weddad wife home on Christmas day, and the engine was shut down at 7 p. m. Tuesday. On the following atternoor another test was made of the capacity

of the well. The farm is situated on the south side of the river. I drove to the well by way of the iron bridge. On my arrival there I found a group of oil men (there were probably thirty of them) standing about the well and taking a lively interest in its output. The dis charge from the pipe was about one-half water and one-half oil. It was pumping at the rate of 150 barrels of oil in the twenty-four hours. The spectators were


