WHOLESALE BURGLARY.

Tionesta Visited by a Gang of Burglars Friday Night.

Sometime last Friday night a gang of burglars visited Tionesta and made successful raids on three business places and one private residence.

The clothing and gents' furnishing store of Miles & Armstrong was entered by the burglars prying up the back window with a crow-bar or lever of some sort, and seven pairs of shoes, two dozen silk handkerchiefs and mufflers, several pairs of pants, underclothing and other furnishings were taken, amounting in all, as near as can be estimated, to about \$100.

The thieves were "slink" enough to leave all the boxes behind, consequently it will be impossible to identify the goods.

J. R. Morgan's grocery and confectionery store was broken into and a quantity of cigars and tobacco and groceries taken, but it is difficult to estimate the amount of the loss. L. Agnew's billiard room was also entered and ten dollars in cash and a box of cigars were stole.

The residence of ex-County Treasurer Q. Jamieson was entered via the cellar and six dollars in cash and a lot of doughnuts and a pan of milk taken. No clue to the identity of the marauders has been found as yet, but it is thought that there were three in the gang as a number of our town people were awakened during the night and three men were seen going along the street. A great many different opinions are given, but it is difficult to state whether the gang was composed of local "taint" or not. One thing is certain—the thieves will take the easiest means of access to the places entered.
