In the bill of appropriations for military works which is now before the British Parliament there is an item of \$1,250,000 for increasing the fortification on the Island of Santa Lucia, in the West Indies. The fortifications already there are said to be the strongest of their kind in the world, and no outsider has ever been permitted to visit them. The appeal for increased equipment shows that Great Britain recognizes the value of the West Indies as a base of military and naval operations in the Western world.

EVERYTHING except silver seems to be strong in the markets these days. Silver is down close to the lowest point it ever reached, and no sign of an advance is in sight. Its condition in this respect resembles that of the party which championed it last year—that is, the silver coin, like the silver party, is worth less than half what it pretends to be worth. Everybody would be glad to see silver twice as high as it is now, yet everybody with brains knows that the party which tried to boom it hurt it. That party's extravagances and follies destroyed all chances which its intelligent friends ever had of inveigling the country to "do some thing for silver" in the future.—St. Louis Globe Democrat.

A SPECIAL from Washington states that Representative C. W. Stone filed at the Treasury Department Thursday the application of F. M. Abbott, formerly of Warren county, but now of Mississippi, to be Register of the Treasury. Representative Stone, Olmstead and Kirkpatrick called upon Secretary Sherman in the interest of Dr. Pitcairn, of Altoona, who wants to be consul at Dresden, and E. A. Abrams, who wants to be consul at Bermuda.

Representative Charles W. Stone was also an early caller and had a talk with the President regarding the application of ex-Representative W. W. Brown for the Commission of Pensions. The President also desired to know Mr. Stone's views about the membership of the international monetary commission that he expects to appoint very soon.

Representative C. W. Stone has introduced a general pension bill in the House. The bill provides that all soldiers and sailors who were injured in a way to be equivalent to the loss of a foot or hand shall receive a pension of \$30 per month.

Of Interest to Everybody.

Spring is rapidly approaching. It is absolutely necessary to good health during the summer, that all decaying vegetable matter be at once removed from the cellars and the entire premises burned. It ought to be taken to some convenient point, such as over the bank or river a few rods above the bridge, where it can be burned. We especially call attention to rules 19, 20 and 21, page 7, Board of Health. Also to rule 49.

This rule is violated by many, without intending a wrong. Refuse sticks, old cans, rotten vegetables etc. are taken from cellars and lots and thrown on streets, thoughtlessly as to risk of health and life. A good horse may be killed by a sick town or left on the street, and if so, the Borough would have to pay for it, and the money comes out of the pockets of taxpayers. Again this refuse is thrown into the drains at side of the street, thereby preventing the free flow of water, to carry off the filth, which is left to evaporate and be breathed into the lungs, thus feeding the body with the vilest kind of putrid matter, bacteria, etc., which if seen as it would sicken not only a human, but even a brute. Aside from this, these little obstructions in drains cause the Borough to be at a large expense in cleaning them out, the taxpayers furnishing the money. A little thoughtfulness or laziness in permitting filth to get in the drain in front of your premises may take a dollar or two out of your pocket in taxes. Rules 23, 31 and 32 are violated. If you are not familiar with the rules call on Secretary of Board of Health and get them and study them.

The Board will soon make a general inspection. We hope to find everything in good sanitary condition. See rule 10 to duties of health officer. The state laws make it the duty of Health Boards to see that all regulations regarding the health of citizens are strictly enforced. The law also requires plumbers to obtain a license from Health Board before doing any work. The act also requires that all births and deaths should be reported to Health Board. Last year there were 8 births and 7 deaths in the Borough and only 1 death and no births reported.

Rule 62 makes the penalty for violating any of the regulations. Rule 33 makes it the duty of police and constables to enforce these rules. The Constable has a right to arrest any one caught violating the rules. T. F. RITCHIEY, Sec. Board of Health.

Ordinance No. 8.

An Ordinance for the erecting, building, repairing and maintaining sidewalks on both sides of all the streets, alleys, lanes and thoroughfares now opened or hereafter to be opened for public travel in the Borough of Tionesta, Pa. Be it ordained and enacted by the Burgess and Town Council of the Borough of Tionesta, Pa., that it is hereby ordained and enacted by authority of the same and by virtue of the powers vested in them by and under the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, relating thereto: That sidewalks shall be constructed, built, repaired and maintained on both sides of all the streets, alleys, lanes and thoroughfares now opened or hereafter to be opened for public travel in the said Borough of Tionesta, in such manner and at such place or places, at such time or times or on any day, and material as the Council of said Borough may from time to time, by resolution, determine and direct.

Sec. 2.—That whenever said Council shall so determine to build or repair such sidewalk or sidewalks, it shall give notice thereof to the owners or occupiers of the lots along the front of which such sidewalk or sidewalks are to be built, specifying the manner of construction, width and material to be used in such walk or walks. And if such walk or walks are not built by such owner or occupier, within thirty days after notice, then the said Borough shall build the same and charge the price of construction to such owners of lots along which the walk or walks are to be built, or the owner or owners of the lots along which the walk or walks are to be built, by entering a municipal lien therefor and enforcing payment in the same manner as mechanics liens are by law collected, or which said amount shall be collected by an action of assumpsit, without entering lien, as the council may determine.

Sec. 4.—All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances inconsistent with the foregoing are hereby repealed. Ordained and enacted into a law in Council this 24th day of March, 1897. J. T. DALE, President of Council.
