OVERCROWDED INSANE HOSPITAL.

Dr. Curwen Issues an Important Statement.

Warren, Pa., Aug. 12.-The State Hospital for the Insane at Warren, Penna. was constructed and organized for the care and treatment of the insane of the countles of Warren, Crawford, Erie, Mercer, Venango, Clarion, Forest, Mc-Kean, Eik and Cameron, and Potter was

afterward added by Legislative Act. The number of insane from these ounties on the first of August, 1897, was 668; private patients from different sec tions of the commonwealth, 83; from 24 countles outside of the district, 284; making the total 1015; showing a very much overerowded hospital. The capacity of the hospital when constructed was con idered to be for 700 patients.

The law requires that "while the inances of the State do not permit ample provision for all cases of insanity, recent uses shall have preference over those of long standing." In order to meet this requirement of the law, it is respectfully and earnestly requested that before maklug arrangements to bring a patient to the hospital, a statement be sent to the superintendent, giving the sex; age; length of time insane; the first symptoms, dating back n 4 longor than six months; any previous at tacks; any complications that may exist, such as paralysis, epilepsy, or alcohol

No patient will be admitted unless these requirements are fully complied with; the question simply being whether Klinestiyer are solourning at Chautauqua this provision of the law shall be complied with, or the bospital completely closed to any further admissions, a d the closing of the hospital is not a thing to be desired.
