The report of State Treasurer Haywood for the month ending Aug. 31 shows a big balance of almost \$5,000,000. With reviving business in every direction this balance is not likely to fall much below these figures except when heavy payments are made on account of the school appropriation.

This riled the Governor, and he now threatens to resign his membership of the Commission.
