The Capitol Commission.

Auditor-General Mylin, and Senator McCarroll, two of the Capitol Commissioners, resent the insinuations of Governor Hastings and others that there is any thought of jobbery in the erection of the new Capitol.

Mr. Mylin says that the Governor is trying to hoodwink the people. "To many of the people," he continues, "who have not kept close watch on the legislation on this subject and subsequent proceedings, are not aware or probably have forgotten, that the 'scheme' of the Governor was to build five separate buildings."

He maintains that the idea of the other commissioners, to have but one building, and costing perhaps \$1,500,000, would be the most economical and best in the end. He says he does not think the Governor's plan to build a \$550,000 capitol "will make a creditable building, because it is too cheap. Still it may fire the heart of the terra cotta statesman."

Mr. Mylin then warns up and says: "I spurn the idea and the intimation that there were jobs in it. It is only those who have had experience in jobbery that are so ready to cast a stigma upon their peers and try to blacken their character. For my part, and I speak for my colleagues as well as myself. We stand ready to have all kinds of jobbery investigated."

Which is rather a startling insinuation for the Auditor General to make.—Pun's Spirit.

In the injunction proceedings in the Dauphin county courts, the Governor, and Attorney-General McCormick were defeated, Judge Simonon deciding in favor of the commission. The Attorney-General will appeal to the Supreme Court.

DeLone Takes a Walk.

Senior Dupuy DeLone, Spanish Minister at Washington, has written himself out of a job, and is no longer in business at the U. S. capitol. Mr. DeLone wrote a letter to his friend Canalejas at Havana, indecently censuring President McKinley and criticizing his message to Congress, using the following language:

Besides the natural and inevitable coarseness with which he repeats all that the press and public opinion of Spain has said of Weyler, it shows once more that McKinley is weak and catering to the rabble, and, besides, a low politician, who desires to leave a door open for me and to stand well with the jingoes of his party.

In less than twenty-four hours after this insulting letter was made public the offensive Spaniard was relieved of his office, and his resignation, having been telegraphed to the Spanish cabinet, was accepted, before Uncle Sam had time to get his boots on and help the offender off the grass at the toe of one of them.

There is some speculation as to what effect this incident may have in the matter of a probable scrimmage between the United States and Spain, but it is likely to pass without further notice unless the Spanish government should become insolent and continue to uphold the deposed official in his insults.

The second trial of Leigert, the Chicago sausage maker, for the murder of his wife, ended in conviction, and the jury fixed the penalty of life imprisonment instead of hanging. A new trial has been asked for.

The January customs receipts were double those for August. Steady gains are one of the leading characteristics of the Dingly law.

The United States is now represented by Ambassadors to London, Berlin, Paris, Rome and St. Petersburg. They carry more weight than before in the diplomatic world, and are granted a prompter hearing at court.

JAPAN has under construction four immense battle-ships, ten large cruisers and twenty-three large torpedo-boats, which will make her navy the third largest in the world. The Japanese fleets will have something to say about future affairs on the Pacific.

A CORRESPONDENT says that Tom Watson, who will be the Populist candidate for Governor of Georgia, has defended nineteen cases of capital crime and cleared the prisoner in every case except one. Mr. Watson's sly voice seems to be less effective with the voter than with the juror.

THERE is evidence of the rank Congressman Arnold takes in national councils in his late appointment as a member of the Republican Congressional Campaign Committee. At a caucus of the committee held in Washington last week new members were chosen from the delegations of various States, one additional member being taken from Pennsylvania, and that was Mr. Arnold. His friends applaud the distinction and consider the selection well made, as Mr. Arnold is a good campaigner, an ingenious student of public situations and his political beliefs are Republican unalloyed.

THE Democratic papers are rejoicing over the exclusion of American fruit from Germany, and are hoping that there is truth in the story that American wines and horses will also be shut out. They were jubilant a few years ago when Germany prohibited the importation of American pork, bacon and lard. Anything which is calculated to injure or discredit the country always brings joy to the Democrats. Their triumph in the present instance, however is likely to be very short. If the German Bundesrath's resolution does not restrain the German customs officials, action by the American Congress will. The interdiction is a surrender to the German producers and dealers who want to secure a monopoly of the market, as that was which shu out American pork. This time the United States, if the unjust discrimination is continued, will, through its customs laws, strike back.—Globe Democrat.
