WAR NOT LIKELY.

There is nothing new in war circles of the past few days, and no new lad has been sprung by the "yellow journals" to make anything like a respectable scare. The promptness and unanimity with which the \$50,000,000 appropriation passed both Houses of Congress, thus putting a half hundred million at the immediate disposal of the administration, has astonished the world, and in its notice to Spain as to what she may expect in case she concludes to try conclusions with Uncle Sam, is worth more than a good sized navy. If President McKinley had asked for double the amount it would have been just as freely given. As soon as the naval court of inquiry submits its report the President will lay it before Congress with a message accompanying it, and if it is shown that the destruction of the Maine was anything but an accident, Spain will be asked to settle all accounts, including indemnity for the lives lost. It is also strongly hinted that Congress will be asked to recognize the independence of Cuba. The work of fortifying our coast defenses in all parts is being briskly carried forward, and when needed everything will be in readiness to command respect for any demand which this government feels called upon to make.

Meantime we believe there will be no war.

Alliance and Friendship.

Discussion in London of a possible British-American alliance does not take a very serious tone, though the comment is entirely friendly. English Statesmen generally understand that the Monroe doctrine is opposed to any foreign alliance, and that it has been the policy of the country to avoid any such from the time when George Washington delivered his farewell warning against entanglements with foreign powers until the present time. At the same time it is believed by them that in a movement of supreme danger to Great Britain the United States would exert every legitimate influence to avert the catastrophe.

This is a very fair view of the attitude of this country. On this side of the ocean it is quite generally understood that the interests of Great Britain and the United States are very much allied; that a serious injury to the one would be an injury to the other. If the United States were in danger of defeat by another power England would find means to lend assistance. But there is no such danger existing, and the talk about alliance and putting the British fleet at our disposal is only an extreme expression of good will, without further significance. We are amply able to meet Spain without any assistance.

No doubt Great Britain and other European countries have been favorably impressed by the conservative disposition of this country in the present situation. The impression has been held abroad that the Yankees were a nation of jingoes, ready to go to any extreme for vengeance, or to meet a political exigency. Instead, it has been demonstrated that war is deprecated, that the only extreme disposition is that of tolerance toward an insolent and barbarous monarchy. Naturally, Great Britain expresses its admiration by friendly encouragement, and the other powers stand aside in the conviction that if war does come the right will be on the side of the United States.—Pittsburg Dispatch.

The death of General William S. Rosecrans on the 12th inst. removes the last of the really great generals of the late war on either side of the conflict. He was 79 years of age.

The trial of Sheriff Martin and his deputies for the Lattimer shooting last fall, in which a number of striking rioters were killed, ended in a verdict of acquittal on the 9th inst., in the Luzerne county courts.

Representative W. C. Arnold, of the Clearfield district, has been named as Pennsylvania's representative on the Republican Congressional committee. Mr. Arnold is an enthusiastic Republican, an effective campaigner and the distinction given him is most worthily bestowed.—Holidaysburg Register.

The appropriation of \$50,000,000 by Congress will not necessitate the issue of bonds. The Secretary of the Treasury says that the treasury is amply prepared to meet any demands that may be made upon it. On Feb. 1st the cash on hand was reported at \$856,671,766. Who says your Uncle Sam is not in a prosperous condition?

CARDINAL GIBBINS, of Baltimore, gave good advice in his address at the mass for the repose of souls of the men who went down in the Maine. He counseled silence and order and an upholding of the President's hands at this critical period, and he rebuked the yellow newspapers and jingoes who are so anxious for war before they learn whether there is a cause for war.

A DISPATCH from Centre county to the Pittsburg papers states that Deputy Secretary of the Commonwealth W. F. Reeder will not be a candidate for the Republican nomination for Congress in this district. The name of A. Wayne Cook of this county has been mentioned in connection with the Congressional nomination, but whether by Mr. Cook's sanction we do not know. On the Democratic side a number of names have been mentioned, among them, Col. Jack Spangler, defeated in '96 by Mr. Arnold; ex-Judge D. L. Krebs and Matt. Savage of Clearfield county; and Prof. Davis of Clarion Normal school, and D. M. Gary, also of Clarion county.

The Hon. John Wanamaker has notified the "business men's league" that he will accept the nomination for Governor, and in his letter intimates that we must have an executive who will not approve "padded pay rolls, legislative junkets, mileage grabbing," etc., in which he is quite right. But what is the matter with having a Governor, also, who will not veto an eminently fair and just mercantile license bill at the request of the great merchant-princes of the State, thus beating the Commonwealth out of a yearly revenue of a million or a million and a half dollars; enough, in fact, in one year, to pay all the legislative junkets and padded pay rolls that have been allowed in the last 20 years, with a good balance left?

The Brooklyn Eagle, that able independent Democratic paper, in speaking of the character of President McKinley as it is being revealed, says: "The year between March 4, 1897 and March 4, 1898, reveals William McKinley as a patriotic American, a cautious but firm Executive, a conciliatory but self-respecting politician in his relations with Congress, a pronounced but un-factional Republican in his relations with his party, a consistent protectionist in his economic convictions, a courageous friend of civil service reform, and an official who, knowing war as a soldier and loving peace as a citizen cultivates the things which make for peace in the spirit and attitude of our Government, while not unmindful of that duty of readiness for war which emergencies, neither of our creation nor of our choosing, have forced upon the national attention. The President is quite as large a man as his eulogists have maintained. He is a far better man than his opponents represent. He is a much abler man than Mugwump criticism, with the intolerance of half estimate and the purlininess of half lights, can conceive anyone to be but themselves."
