SKAGUAY, Alaska, March 23, 1898. presents a panorama of magnificent sce

Skaguay isla town of board houses and ents. Here we have all kinds of eating louses. Gambling schemes and games are Wm. Agey's Sudden Death.

This is the proper thing to do and it saves all trouble about customs and freights. can buy flour for \$1.65 a sack, and bacon for 15 cents per pound, and everything else in proportion; from 25 to 50 cents you get a good meal and a first class bed from 25 cents to \$1. Everything is reasonable, as Skaguay is only six or seven days from the Pacific coast cities. Don't take any stock in the newspaper reports to the contrary. I like a big 240-pound stuffed toad with my heavy clothing on and a belt and revolved full of cartridges. Before we get in the Klondike I think my clothes will not fit me so quick. You have no idea how warm our clothing is, but it takes a good man to carry it around.
